CAMPFIRE WEEK IS OBSERVED IN KLAMATH FALLS

This week, March 15 to 21, is national campfire week and is being observed in Klamath Falls, opening yesterday with a beautiful service in the Presbyterian church in the afternoon, when Sunchacho, Winema and Nawahkanoka campfires had charge of the services. The girls were gowned in their ceremonial robes and some, who have not earned honors as yet, wore conventional middie and bloomers as worn in the summer on hikes and during work.

Thirteen years ago, March 17, Dr. Frances Gulick with several others interested in the project, took her children into the New York mountains and worked out the honors of the group.

Yesterday the entire nation observed the first day of national campfire week in the churches. Today, Monday, is "school day," when the campfire work is discussed before students of various schools in the city. Tuesday is designated as "radio day" and the members of Sunchacho group will gather at the home of Miss Elvira Call to listen in on a radio program. Wednesday is known as "club day" and each of the three groups is sending four girls to be present at the chamber of commerce forum to entertain the organization. Mrs. Lina Sabin, guardian of one of the groups, will be present to discuss briefly "Campfire Work." Thursday is observed by hikes, however, as the girls are in school, this will be impossible. Friday is the big day of the week, when the girls emphasize a

certain phase of the campfire code. Last year they stressed music, this year the girls are stressing home work, and each girl is to entertain members of her own family with a "party," making the plans herself and serving the food. On Saturday afternoon there will be a council meeting when the girls will conduct ceremonies and receive the beads of national honors, one of which is given for the work on Friday.

Rice, guardian and Miss Donna Mack, assistant guardian, of Sunchacho group, sponsored by the Presbyterian church; Mrs. Lina Sabin, guardian, and Miss Thelma Grizzle, assistant guardian of Winema group, also sponsored by the Presbyterian church; Miss Ruth Minor, guardian, and Miss Della Hawkins, assistant guardian of Nawahkanoka group, sponsored by the Mills school.

The entry appears as "Rhinelander, Mrs. Leonard Kip (Phillip) Jones, Mrs. Alice B., married October 14, at New Rochelle, N. Y."

Shortly after the marriage of Rhinelander to Miss Jones, it became known that a census taker had placed Rhinelander's bride in his records as a "mulatto."

The couple separated shortly thereafter, and in his annulment suit Rhinelander alleged that the bride had deceived him about her race.

Names which have disappeared from the social register in recent years include Millicent Rogers, who married Count Ludwig Salm-Hoogstraeten; Mrs. James A. Stillman and Mrs. W. E. D. Stokes.

Mechanical Cashier Makes Change and Admits Persons to Trains

Patrons of an elevated railway in an eastern city have been testing a fare-collecting apparatus at the station gates installed to do the work of a human cashier. It automatically returns ten cents from a deposit of a quarter or a fifty-cent piece, returning the correct change and, at the same time, releasing the catch on the turnstile to permit entrance to the trains. Dimes—the regular fare—also are accepted, but the machine will not handle paper money, pennies or nickels. It is believed that the device will be of aid in rush hours as passengers with the exact fare, or coins which the contrivance will change, can pass through quickly.

Benches for the lawn or garden are useful and ornamental but cannot be moved easily from place to place as needed. This limitation has been overcome in a seat which an Englishwoman has invented. It

Land Swimming Rack Teaches Right Strokes in Two Lessons

With the aid of a machine invented in England, beginners are said to be able to



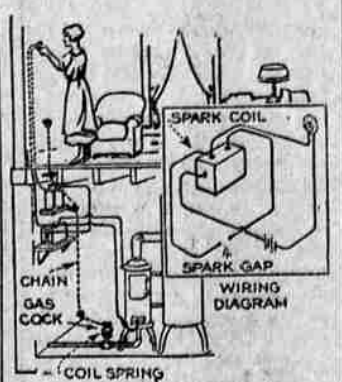
Learn the right swimming strokes in two lessons. The pupil lies prone on a cushion and his hands and feet are strapped to special pads. When the instructor turns a crank, the student's extremities are automatically made to perform the correct swimming motions as the rests to which they are attached are moved in the proper order by a chain-gear arrangement.

Acid-Proof Table Top

For chemical laboratories, battery-service stations, and other places where acids are handled, an acid-proof coating on the table tops is almost a necessity. The following two solutions are used for this purpose: The first consists of iron sulphate, 4 parts; copper sulphate, 4 parts; potassium permanganate, 8 parts; and water, 100 parts. The second solution consists of aniline, 12 parts; hydrochloric acid, 18 parts; water, 100 parts. Two coats of the first solution are applied hot with a brush and allowed to dry; any dried coating that has not soaked in is then rubbed off. The surface is then given two coats of the second solution and later a thin coat of raw linseed oil is rubbed on with a cloth. If the table top is painted or varnished, it should be scraped down so that the solutions will penetrate the wood. In cases where this method was used on some old laboratory tables the result was highly satisfactory. The surface turns ebony-black a few hours after the coating has been applied.

Electric Lighter for Water Heat

Many houses have a gas water heater in the basement for summer use. To light it it is necessary to go downstairs, which is rather unhandy. With the apparatus shown in the illustration, it is possible to turn on the gas and ignite it with electric spark. The valve in the gas pipe is provided with a coil spring, which is off the gas automatically. It is opened means of a length of furnace pipe wound on a spool that is attached to a pulley as indicated. The chain is run over pulleys, through the wall into the room above, the end being fitted with a rubber plate on the wall holds the chain up in the same manner as a furnace-damp control. These fixtures can be purchased at any hardware store. Two dry cells are connected in series to a Ford ignition switch which can be obtained at a garage. One side of the coil is grounded on the stove and the other wire terminates about 1/2



in from the burner, directly above the gas holes so that after the gas has been turned on, a spark jumping this gap will immediately ignite it. Quicklime added to benzine, in the proportion of about 3 oz. to the gallon, will deodorize it. Shake well, then strain through cheesecloth.

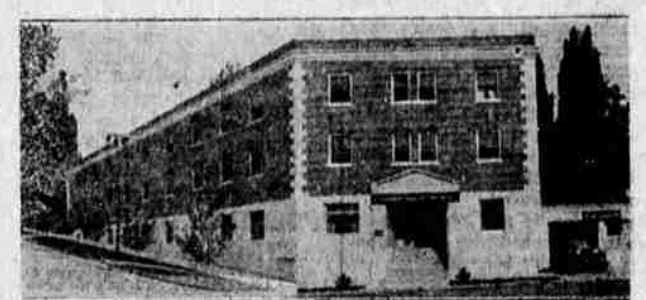
