FINAL ACTION ON CHURCH DEFERRED TILL PLANS COME

Although unanimous in the opinion that a new Episcopal church should be built on the site selected by the Bishop's committee, the Episcopal congregation in session last night suggested that plans should be submitted to the congregation before final action be taken. The congregation endorsed the suggestion of the committee that the rectory be sold. The financial status of the church was clearly explained by a black board talk by the Rev. T. A. Meryweather, Episcopal minister. Sunday, March 29, is tentatively set as the date for a meeting when final details relative to the new church will be made.
