REMOVE CATTLE CARCASSES FROM BAY AND CREEKS

McLemore Acts Quickly When Notified by Health Department

Menace to the water supply of Rocky Point and summer cottages along Pelican bay was eliminated yesterday when Jack Ryan, working under contract for D. M. McLemore, livestock operator, hauled out fifteen carcasses of dead cattle from the waters of Pelican bay and creeks nearby, and disposed of the carcasses in such a way as to protect the public against any pollution of the water in that territory, according to a report received today by County Health Officer Dr. G. S. Newsom.

Dr. Newsom will leave Friday for Rocky Point to make a personal inspection of the situation and definitely ascertain whether all sanitary requirements have been complied with. Quick action on the part of Mr. McLemore, the owner of the dead cattle, when apprised of the danger to inhabitants of the territory who depend on the cold streams in that region for water supply, was commended by Dr. Newsom today.

Opinion by Justice Belt, Judge Gustav Anderson reversed and case remanded. Petition for rehearing denied in Kesterson vs. California Oregon Power company et al.

(Continued From Page One) weave testimony with which others hope to brand me as a murderer" and "to send an innocent man to prison so that something which rightfully belongs in his hands might be snatched away."

Still Defiant "Suppose, for the sake of argument, I did study germs," the statement continued. "I had a perfect right as a practicing attorney to do anything I wished but I didn't. I wouldn't know what to do with typhoid germs if I had them and never had any in my possession furthermore.

"All there is against me is a dead body and a motive. These two facts, supported by a lot of babbie, gossip and suspicion are intended to break me down."
