OREGON BISHOP TO VISIT HERE

Rev. William Remington of
Pendleton to Confirm
Class of Candidates

For the purpose of confirming a class of children and adults who have been schooled in the preparation of Confirmation by Rev. T. A. Merryweather of St. Paul's Episcopal church, Bishop William P. Remington of Pendleton, Bishop of the diocese of Eastern Oregon will arrive in Klamath Falls for the Sunday services of March 29. The Confirmation was scheduled for April 19, however due to pressing business of the Bishop, the classes are rushed for March 29. There are three in the children's class and four in the adult's class, however more are expected in the near future. The Confirmation will take place at 11 a. m. morning service.

It is possible that Bishop Remington will be present at the dinner given by the members of the Church Women's Service League on March 27, and if so he will probably address the guests. While in Klamath Falls a meeting of the congregation will be called to decide on final plans for the building of the new church.

EFFICIENCY SOUGHT IN MAIL DELIVERY

Application has been made by Postmaster John McCall in regard to more efficient mail service on the Ashland stage. The stage which leaves Ashland at 10:35 will be able to pick up the mail pouch from train No. 13 which passes through Ashland at 10:25. If this petition goes through the approval of the Fourth Assistant Postmaster, the mail will arrive in Klamath Falls from the north at least three and one half hours in advance of the previous delivery. The mail thus scheduled would arrive in the city at two p. m. At present it is coming to Klamath Falls at 4:45 p. m. via the stage.

An average of 85 percent of First class mail is being taken over the Ashland-Klamath Falls at present, this, according to McCall, will be of interest to the merchants of the city.

WAIT TILL LAST Tax Payers Putting Off Obligations Until Final Day

That there will be a "bum's rush" on the sheriff's office April 6 to pay taxes is the prediction of Garret Van Ripper, chief deputy of the sheriff's office and in charge of tax collecting. Taxpayers are not paying their taxes for the first half year of 1924 as fast as it was hoped and as a result there will be many who will have to wait some time before being waited on, the deputy said. On April 7, penalty and interest on delinquent taxes go into effect and it will be to avoid the penalty that tax payers will flock in to pay their taxes before the dead line.

BELIEVE MINERS DEAD IN BIG EXPLOSION

FAIRMONT, W. Va., March 18.—A hundred or more men, frantically, but hopelessly pushed their way through the underground recesses of Mine 41, of the Bethlehem Mines Corporation, three miles west of here today, in an effort to find 34 miners who were entombed last night when an explosion wrecked the shaft.

Not since a sheet of flame burst up through the opening that extends 300 feet below the ground has any one on the surface heard from the imprisoned men. A low rumbling preceded the explosion which wrecked the mine's lifting equipment and fans, caused the tangle to totter and fall into the shaft and which shook buildings in Fairmont, broke windows and shook doors from their hinges on houses 300 feet away.

Since that moment crowds of frantic women and children have milled about the mine trying to find some word of the entombed men. Only two rescue workers had been able to send word to the surface and that word was not encouraging. R. M. Lambie, chief mine inspector of West Virginia, and a companion were the first to go down. They pushed their way past the debris to the stable where the mine horses were kept. All the 34 animals were dead. Then they pushed on into one of the headings. The air was bad, they said. That was all. They could find no trace of the men and when they came to the surface experts from every mine in the district organized themselves into groups, ready to explore every heading to its furthest reaches.

While not definitely determined, gas was believed to have caused the explosion, and late last night Mine Superintendent Benton Mitchell, said he did not believe any of the men could be alive.

Soon after the explosion occurred there were reports that dynamite bombs had been dropped into the shaft but these were later denied. The mine opened on a non-union basis last October and employs about 250 men.
