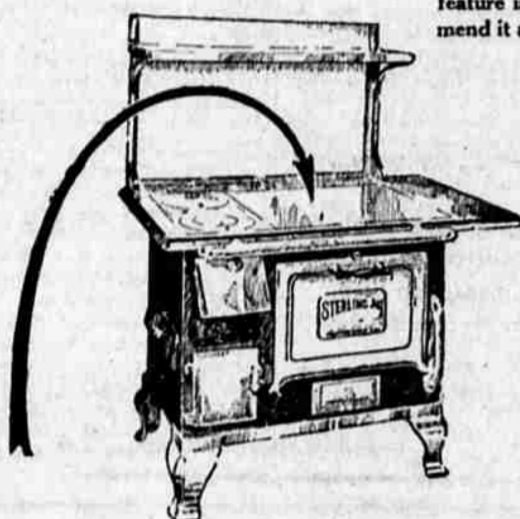

SECOND CHARGE MAY BE PRESSED AGAINST MRS. SUSAN CROWLEY

Although no definite decision has been made, Mrs. S. A. Crowley, arrested last Saturday night in the raid on the Glenn rooming house and "Cabbage Patch," behind the hotel, will in all probability be forced to stand trial on a charge of maintaining a nuisance, Acting District Attorney W. P. Myers announced today.

Following refusal of Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker, acting yesterday afternoon as committing magistrate, to bind Mrs. Crowley over to the grand jury on a charge of conducting a "sawdy" house, the question arose whether or not the state would stand a good chance in obtaining a conviction on the nuisance charge. Mr. Myers is of the opinion that the evidence is sufficient to warrant a trial in the case. The trial would probably come before Justice court tomorrow afternoon.

Following the hearing yesterday afternoon, the district attorney's office concluded to move to dismiss the charge of possession of liquor against A. R. ... of the ... hotel. Motion for dismissal was to have been submitted to Justice of the Peace Hunsaker this afternoon.

VANCOUVER HOLDS BIG CELEBRATION

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 19.—This city is celebrating today the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of Fort Vancouver, which in the early part of the last century was the headquarters of the Hudson Bay company in the Oregon country—all that vast territory between the Rocky mountains and the east and west oceans.

Ground will be broken this afternoon for the construction of a stockade to reproduce the old fort, which was the headquarters of civilization in the Pacific Northwest in the days before the immigration of the 40's.

A. P. WILL MEET IN NEW YORK SHORTLY

NEW YORK, March 19.—To provide more time for the discussion of matters of general interest to the membership, the board of directors of the Associated Press has called a special meeting of all members of the Associated Press to be held at 2:30 p. m. in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel in New York on April 20, one day in advance of the regular meeting of Associated Press members. In recent years a one day session has been found not to provide adequate time for the consideration of essential matters.

The address of Vice President Dawes to the members of the Associated Press will be delivered at luncheon on the second or regular annual meeting day of the association.

HEALTH OFFICER INSPECTS THE LIBERTY THEATER

A thorough inspection of the Liberty Theater was made today by Dr. George Newsom, county health officer. The doctor reports the heating and ventilating system sanitary and more than adequate to guarantee plenty of pure air at all times. The floors are thoroughly cleaned every day and twice each week are saturated with Phenol compound and floor oil, thus keeping down dust and acting as a germicide as well. The doctor remarked that it would be a tough germ indeed that would last long on that floor and assured the management of the popular playhouse that they were observing all essential safe guards of the public health.

The theater is also being repainted and decorated both inside and in the lobby and the theater will appear in a bright new dress in the next few days. This in itself is added health insurance.
