EPIDEMIC STILL AT ITS HEIGHT

Health Unit Gives Instructions to Public Regarding Proper Precautions

With the epidemic of influenza—in its present light form little more than La Grippe—still spreading in Klamath Falls and Klamath county, county health authorities and local physicians are working over time in attending to patients and taking proper precautions to prevent development into a virulent epidemic, similar to war time days.

Klamath General hospital reports eighteen patients ill with influenza. However, it was stated, that only one or two of this number show any signs of developing pneumonic complications.

For the benefit of the public, Dr. G. S. Nowam, head of the county health unit issued the following instructive information concerning the present epidemic, which was received this morning from the state health department:

"While we do not think there is cause for serious alarm, there is no question that influenza is more prevalent than it has been for some time in Oregon. Reports from other parts of the United States show that there are many cases of the disease. Notwithstanding the great amount of study that has been devoted to influenza, we are still unable to prescribe measures for its complete control. It is impossible to classify this disease properly until more studies have been made by the clinical bacteriologist.

"As a result of the absence of exact diagnostic criteria, influenza is today a diagnostic scrap basket into which has been thrown the odds and ends in the way of minor infections which the bacteriologist is not yet ready to help the clinician classify with precision. The cause of the epidemic, or of the supposedly existing sporadic influenza is not surely known. We are as far as ever from conclusive knowledge as to the source of influenza.

"There is undoubtedly some connection between the common cold and influenza. There seem to be cases of common cold which are almost indistinguishable clinically, and the bacteriological findings in the nose and throat of influenza

BONDING COMPANY WINNER IN ACTION IN CIRCUIT COURT

It took a jury of twelve men just four hours to return a verdict in favor of the bonding company in the case of National Surety company tried yesterday in circuit court before Judge A. L. Leavitt, and even then the division on the case was nine to three in favor of the surety company.

The case was one in which Lewis Pankey sued the National Surety company for \$219.67, held to be the amount due Pankey from the Nettleton-Bruce Eschbach company, contractors on the O. C. & E. railroad. The contracting company went through bankruptcy. It was bonded up to \$25,000 by the Surety company. However, the defense claimed that the Surety company could not be held responsible for the Pankey lien because in the first place Robert E. Strahorn, president of the O. C. & E. company had been given judgment for the amount of the bond in a previous case and because the contracting company was bonded to Strahorn to complete the job.

Jurors in the case were John Van Meter, J. V. Houston, W. T. Elliott, Fred Grennon, R. C. Cowley, E. G. Argraves, C. E. Burton, Harry Messner, J. W. Kerns, J. A. Farley, Lloyd Ryan and W. C. Balfour. Those who held for the surety company were Messrs. Van Meter, Kerns, Balfour, Burton, Houston, Argraves, Ryan and Cowley.

The next civil case set for trial is Fisher vs. Richards, which will open tomorrow before Judge Leavitt.
