PENALTY DEFERRED Wattenburg Given Opportunity to File Permit With Council

When he started to build a porch onto the Frank Ward home on Fourth and Main streets without first having obtained a permit from the city council, R. E. Wattenburg violated a city ordinance which stipulates that before any building can be done inside the fire limits a permit must first be secured. Wattenburg was arrested yesterday on complaint of Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose and brought before Police Judge Lem L. Gaghagen. Providing he would cease building until first securing a permit, penalty would not be exacted. The judge ruled Wattenburg agreed to defer building until he secured a permit.

SWAN LAKE CONCERN BUYS TIMBER LAND
