COMMISSION TO PAY ADDITIONAL BOUNTY

Additional bounties for the killing of wolves, cougars and wild cats will be paid by the state game commission, effective April 1, according to notice received here from the commission today. The additional bounties are \$25 for each wolf, \$25 for each cougar and \$1.50 for each wild cat.

The above bounties are in addition to those paid by the various counties. Hides must be presented to the county clerk of the county in which the animal was killed and affidavit of each killing be made and forwarded to the state game commission.

All wolf hides must be forwarded to the state game commission for identification.

LIQUOR BOAT SEIZED

Motorship Alaska Taken in Alaskan Waters—Officers and Crew Are Arrested

JUNEAU, Alaska, March 29.—The motorship Oregon, seized here yesterday when federal officers found intoxicants aboard, was proceeding today to Tenakee, 75 miles away, under guard put aboard by the United States customs. She is to be back before Monday, when her master, John B. Edwards, Stewart Norman Baber and mess boy go to trial for possession of liquor. Four of the crew pleaded guilty yesterday and were fined \$25 each.

TOWN IS DESTROYED

Earthquake Razes Talifu in Western Chinese Province, Says Wire Dispatch.

SHANGHAI, March 20.—The China inland mission, Reuters agency says, has received a telegram dated March 19, stating that an earthquake has destroyed Talifu, a town in western Yunnan province. A disastrous fire followed and help is needed, the message says.

The foreigners in the neighborhood are safe.

RELIEF WORK IS NOW UNDER WAY

Relief measures were well under way and further increments in strength of personnel, housing facilities for the estimated 8,000 homeless, foodstuffs and medicines was promised from federal state and private sources.

Funeral Plans Delayed

Plans for funerals had not been announced in any of the stricken cities today, but it was believed that with a measure of order being restored from the chaos which prevailed after the tornado struck, arrangements would be made for interring moving hundreds of victims by the end of the week. But few bodies remained unidentified today and it will not be necessary to hold any appreciable number of them for identification.

Possibly two score bodies were so badly mangled as to prevent recognition and it is explained they will be buried with joint services.

Families Wiped Out

Several entire families were wiped out and indications were they would be laid to rest with a single ceremony.

Visitors and slight seers by the carload invaded the tornado district yesterday and today and in places practically blocked traffic for hours.

Murphyboro, West Frankfort and Gorham continued to be the scene of greatest suffering as well as the greatest loss of life although the little town of De Soto virtually obliterated, had a higher percentage of casualties.

THREE MORE BODIES REMOVED FROM MINE

Rescue Efforts in Coal Shaft At Fairmont, West Virginia, Proceeding Today

FAIRMONT, W. Va., March 20.—Three additional bodies were removed this morning from mine number 41 of the Bethlehem Mines Corporation at Barrackville, where 34 men were entombed Tuesday night when an explosion occurred.

The three bodies taken from the mine this morning were badly burned from the fire that followed the blast. Two other bodies had been removed last night.
