REMBRANDT OILS BRING FORTUNES

Etchings of Old Masters Found in Chest Stored for Years in Bank

LONDON, March 15.—After being stored in two wooden chests at a bank for 70 years, a collection of etchings, including 300 by Rembrandt, saw the light of day at auctions in London recently, and realized \$170,865.

The highest individual price paid for a Rembrandt was \$18,000 for "Arnoldus Tholinx." Three others entitled "Christ healing the sick," "Christ before Pilate" and "The Three Crosses," each brought \$5,775. Dutch buyers eagerly competed with English collectors for possession of these almost forgotten works of the old master.

The collection had been made in the early part of last century by Edward Rudge of Abbey Manor, Evenham, whose outlay is believed to have been little more than \$2000.

FORT KLAMATH IS VERITABLE MECCA FOR LIVESTOCKMEN

"Due principally to the fertile range land of the northern Klamath basin country, in the vicinity of Fort Klamath, Klamath county is recognized as a mecca for the cattle and sheep grower."

This is the statement made this morning by H. A. Lindgren, livestock field specialist for the Oregon Agricultural College, here for several days to talk before three meetings of sheep operators, one in Klamath Falls, the second in Merrill tomorrow night and the third at Mallin on Monday.

Mr. Lindgren spoke optimistically of the sheep industry in the state at large. "Last year Oregon gained the highest average price for wool than any other state in the United States. The average was \$9. Scientific methods apply to the raising of sheep just as they apply to the care of dairy cows and of poultry. Sheep operators should follow certain methods of raising sheep if they want to gain the maximum amount of fleeces from each sheep."

Speaking of available range land in Oregon, Mr. Lindgren said there

was 45 million acres of range land in Oregon of which 13 million was unappropriated.

"When the lands are unappropriated, it is just a question of first come first served. As a result the range grass of the unappropriated lands are usually eaten down to the roots and no systematic grazing regulations enforced."

NOTED BRITISHER CALLED BY DEATH

Lord Curzon, Former Foreign Secretary, Succumbs To Attack Of Pneumonia

LONDON, March 20.—Death today claimed the Marquis Curzon of Kedleston, Lord president of the council and former foreign secretary. The end came at 5:35 o'clock, this morning after a fight against pneumonia which developed following his operation of two weeks ago.

The Marquis was 66 years old. The first indication of the break in his health came on March 5, when he collapsed while dressing for a public dinner at Cambridge, at which he was to have delivered a speech. The collapse was marked by faintness and nasal hemorrhage. The

regular medical bulletins regarding his condition failed to name the malady, but "bladder trouble" was generally given as the cause of his collapse.

HEALTH UNITS MAY BE STANDARDIZED DR. STRICKER SAYS

Hopes of the Oregon State Board of Health is to standardize all county health units in Oregon under a unified plan of health work.

This message brought to the local unit last night by Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer who arrived in Klamath falls yesterday on one of his regular visits of inspection. Dr. Stricker conferred with the county health unit force last night, including Dr. G. S. Newsom and County Health Nurse Miss Lydia Fricke. He departed this morning for Jackson county and planned to visit Coos county on a brief inspection trip.

Owing to greater efficiency, it is held that the standardization plan will be a step forward in health work. However, the health officer pointed out, it will be difficult at first to unify all units under one system because of the different problems that arise in each county.
