KIRK PETITION SET

Attempt Will Be Made To Get Klamath Indian Out of Jail

Three hundred and fifty friends and sympathizers of Gordon Kirk, former member of the Klamath tribal council and convicted on a charge of giving intoxicating liquor to two Indian girls, have signed a petition asking for a release from Leavenworth prison. Kirk was sentenced to serve 18 months. Kirk was arrested, tried and convicted in Portland. To judge in the case released him under heavy bond before passing sentence on the request of Kirk, he said that he had important business transactions to complete in Klamath. Kirk jumped his bond, leaving his two bondsmen liable to the amount of the bond. Some months later, Kirk was arrested in Gallup, New Mexico. Brought back to Portland he was sentenced to serve 18 months in the federal penitentiary. United States Commissioner W. C. Thomas, declined to sign a petition, holding that he could not see where leniency should be granted. The petition was sent to Senator McNary in Washington.

Mrs. Will Tompkins of Dairy was a business visitor in the city yesterday.

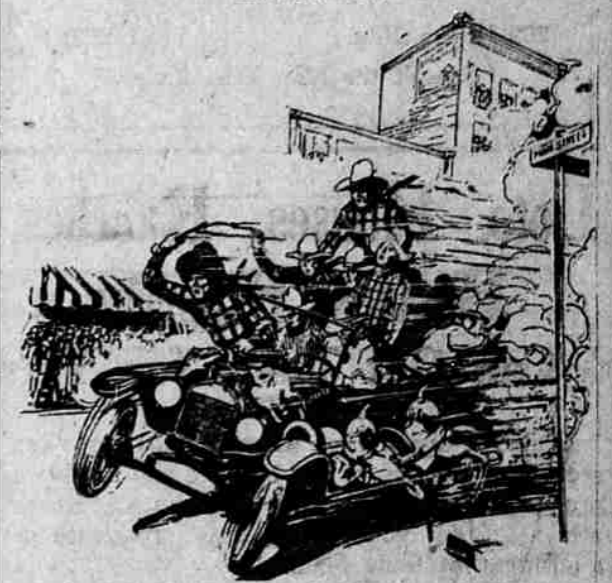
