IGNORE BOOTLEGGERS IS ROTARIAN'S PLEA

Sam Stockton Claims Members Not Observing Code of Ethics If They Drink

PORTLAND, Ore., March 24.—Delegates to the convention of the first district international Rotary were stirred at the morning session today when Sam Stockton of Tacoma, Wash., mounted the rostrum and declared that "in giving aid and comfort to bootleggers" Rotarians are not abiding by the code of Rotary ethics.

Stockton declared that Rotarians to live up to the ethical code should not only abide by the laws of the land, but hold before the young people the example of respect for and upholding the following laws of the land.

"I will not have the temerity to tell any individual that he should or should not take a drink," said Stockton, "but I will have the temerity to say that we are not doing our duty and are not abiding by the ethics of Rotary when by our attitude or action we put ourselves in the position of giving aid and comfort to the bootlegger."

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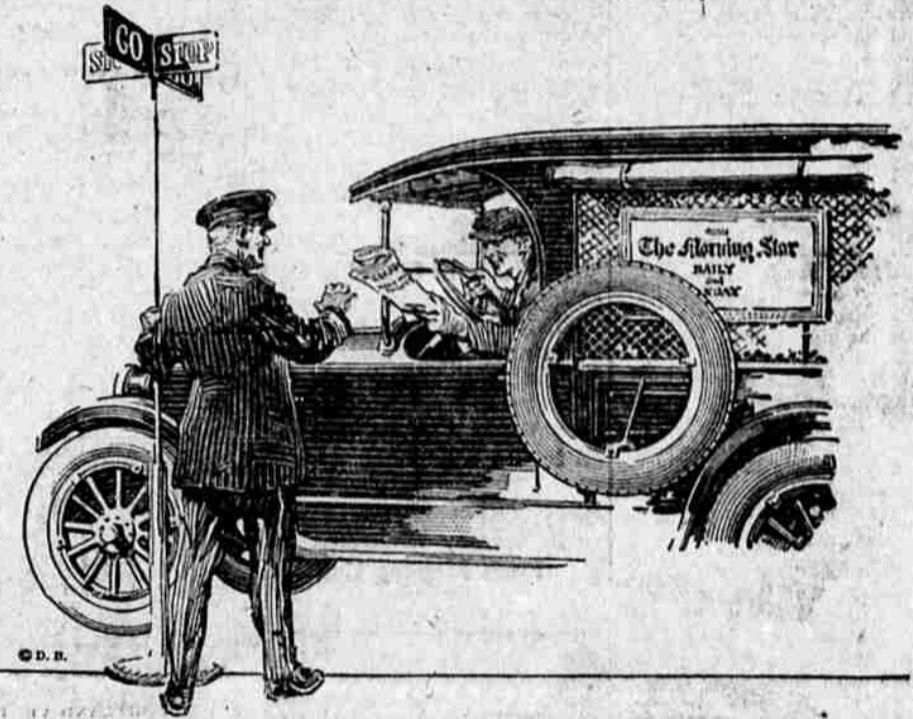
