MISS BEATTY IMPROVES

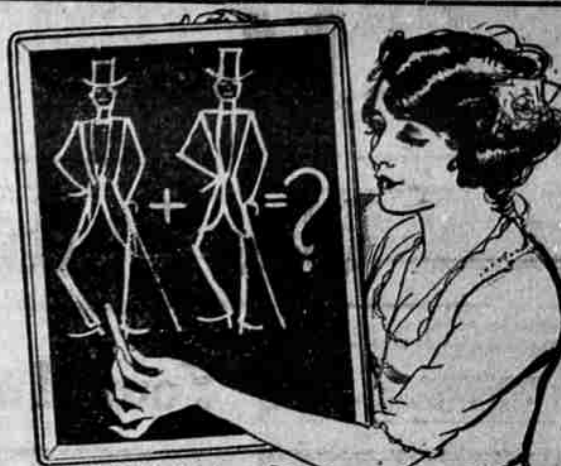
President of Business Women's Club Reported As Recovering

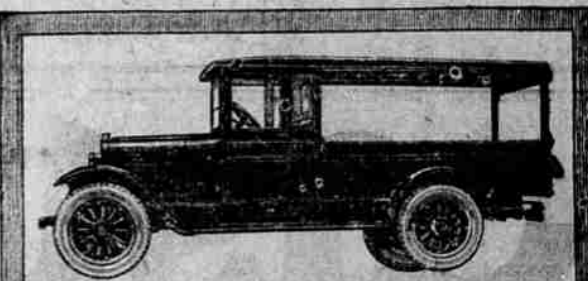

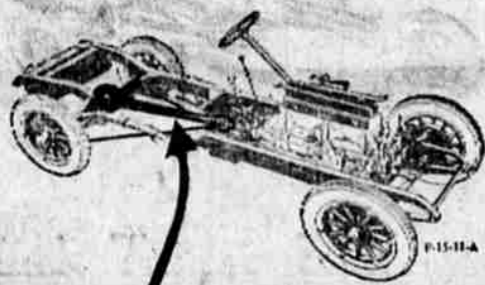
