## JOE GORMAN TO FIGHT GORDON HERE TUESDAY

### Flashy Bantamweights Will Clash in Semi-Final Here

Fight fans of Klamath Falls will be treated to one of the flashiest battles ever staged in this city when Able Gordon and Joe Gorman will fight the semi-final bout in the boxing card at the Scandinavian hall next Tuesday night. Gorman wired today that he would be willing to meet Gordon.

Gordon, in agreeing to fight Gorman, is taking on a man 15 pounds heavier than he is. Gorman usually fights at 130 or 140 pounds and tips the beam at 118 pounds.

But the plucky little bantamweight, veteran of scores of ring battles, merely said: "I'll take him on any time for four rounds. I can left hand jab him till the cows come home."

Gorman is a fighter whose name has graced main events in the big time for many years. He is a fighter from the tip of his shoes to the crown of his head. The two little fighters are old time rivals and their battle will be one of the bitterest and hottest contested ever seen in this county.

## DEMPESEY DISBARRED

Commission Takes Action Following Silence to Ultimatum

NEW YORK, March 24.—The New York state athletic commission today decided to disbar champion Jack Dempsey and his manager, Jack Kearns, on the ineligible list in this state for their failure to reply satisfactorily to the commission's recent ultimatum that Dempsey accept a challenge from Harry Wills.

## MINISTER RESIGNS

VIENNA, March 24.—Albert H. Washburn has tendered his resignation as United States minister to Austria, he made known today.

Mr. Washburn, who was appointed in 1922 by President Harding pointed out that it was customary for American diplomats to place their posts at the disposal of the president in cases of change at the white house, regardless whether they were also inspired by private considerations or not.

## INSURANCE CO. WINS

Case Appealed to Supreme Court Reversed; Judge Calkins Reversed

SALEM, Ore., March 24.—The Firemen's Fund insurance company won its appeal to the state supreme court in the case of the A. W. Walker Auto company of Medford, against the insurance company, appellant, by an opinion written by Chief Justice McBride and handed down today. The opinion reverses Judge Calkins, of the lower court for Jackson county.

## SHEEP MEN HEARD

Wool Dealers Present Views Before I. C. C. Commissioner

PORTLAND, Ore., March 24.—Portland wool dealers, wool warehousemen and representatives of commercial organizations interested in the wool industry of Oregon had their saying today in the hearing before J. B. Campbell, interstate commerce commissioner, on the application of the Boston Wool Trades Association for joint through rates from the west coast states on wool shipments.

## HUNT VETOES BILL

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 24.—Governor Hunt today vetoed the house concurrent resolution presented by the legislature proposing a ratification of the Colorado river compact if the legislators of California and Nevada would agree to a division of water allotted to the lower basin.

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## INDUSTRY HUMS IN STORM AREA

Total Property Loss From Tornado Estimated at \$20,000,000

CHICAGO, March 24.—Southern Illinois and Indiana and other states in the path of last Wednesday's tornado hummed with industry today as the work of rebuilding and restoration progressed.

Warm, muggy weather prevailed in most of the stricken territory as carpenters piled hammer and saw on hundreds of new dwellings and relief workers continued to give aid and comfort to thousands of injured and homeless.

Danger of epidemics was lessened today as sanitary measures were advanced. The water supply in every affected community was watched, and a supply of diphtheria antitoxin was rushed to Carbondale, the relief center.

Pending re-building of factories, relief workers were centering efforts on obtaining employment for workmen, who were the greatest sufferers. Appeals were made to the state to start road construction in the Illinois area to provide temporary employment.

With three additional deaths at Griffin, Indiana, the number of fatalities in five states was increased to 813, but this figure did not include a score of persons believed to have been incinerated at Murphysboro. The Red Cross announced that 2,839 persons were injured. Property loss was estimated in the neighborhood of \$20,000,000.

## PRINCE ARRESTED

LIVERPOOL, March 24.—The self-styled Emir of Kurdistan, Prince Zerdeshno Mohammed Said, deported from the United States, was arrested upon his arrival here today and held pending instructions from the home secretary.

## RUMORS DENIED

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Widely published rumors that several cabinet officials soon are to retire were denied today at the White House.

President Coolidge has not been informed that any member of his cabinet expects to resign and he believes the present membership will remain unchanged.

## HERMAN BEATS ROPER

Former Astoria Heavyweight Left Hooks Way To Ten Round Decision

PORTLAND, Ore., March 24.—Tiny Jim Herman, Omaha heavyweight, won a ten round decision over Bob Roper, of New York here last night in what many fans classed as the best heavyweight bout seen here since the ten round law went into effect. Herman made good use of a left hook to the body and took seven of the ten rounds.

## ARBUCKLE TO WED

"Fatty" Scheduled to Hear Wedding Bells Ring Again Today

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 24.—Wedding bells will ring in celebration of Roscoe Arbuckle's thirtieth birthday tonight, unless something happens to alter the former film comedian's plan to marry Doris Deane, motion picture actress, at her mother's home in San Marino, a suburb, shortly after sunset.

## REMOVAL OF ROSS WILL BE TESTED

Circuit Court Will Determine Whether Governor Had Authority to Fire

PORTLAND, Ore., March 24.—The circuit court of Multnomah county will decide whether Governor Pierce was vested with authority to remove Dr. Thomas W. Ross from the state fish commission, and appoint John C. Veatch, Portland attorney, as the successor.

An action in quo warranto, filed by Dr. Ross today, asks the court to issue a process against Veatch requiring him to answer by what authority he claims to hold the office of commissioner. Authority of the governor to remove Dr. Ross is challenged in the action.

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## COUNCIL TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING

Detail Work on Street Improvements to Be Taken Up Wednesday

Reams of detail work to take place in connection with the street improvement projects in Klamath Falls led the city council last night to make arrangements for a special meeting of the city council to take place tomorrow night in the council chambers.

Following a plea by Captain George Stokes and the city council agreed to change fire equipment of this city from the Pacific coast standard to a national standard. Work will be started on the change immediately and expense will be undertaken by the state.

The Lorenz heating plant was again severely reprimanded by the fire chief in a written report to the city council. The communication charged that the heating plant had not been repaired to accord with certain suggested improvements, and that business men in the city were irate at cinders scattering over the city.
