AT THE PINE TREE

Life in the early California gold camps was not merely a series of fistie brawls, lynchings, and battles with Indians. Every man was particular to attend strictly to his own business.

This information was gleaned by Victor Fleming during the production of his latest Paramount picture, "The Devil's Cargo," due today at the Pine Tree. The story is laid in Sacramento in 1850.

"Life in the gold camps was unusually quiet," one old-timer told Fleming. "An argument always ended in a few moments with one of the debaters being carried away feet first with a few chunks of hot lead in his ribs. Everyone knew this and everyone was careful about mixing into another's affairs."

"The Devil's Cargo," adapted for the screen by A. P. Younger from the story, "The River Boat," by Charles Whittaker, duplicates the little pioneer town of Sacramento as it really was seventy-five years ago. Cut off from the rest of the world, the only communication with neighboring San Francisco being by means of stage coach.

At the time of the story the citizens have banded together in a vigilance committee bent on driving out of the town many undesirables. A young fellow, John Joyce, comes to Sacramento to edit the town's only paper for the advancement of the cause of the vigilantes. He meets and falls desperately in love with Faro Sampson, daughter of the proprietor of the most notorious saloon in the camp. That puts him in bad with the vigilantes and things wind up with his being deported with the others on the river boat.

The boilers on the old ramshackle craft blew up. Many of the passengers land safely at San Francisco, but Joyce, his sister Martha,
