Corinne Griffith Entertains Formally at Dinner. an Elaborate Affair Requiring a Trained Staff of Servants



ENTERTAINING formally requires the assistance of an efficient retinue of servants. To them of course, fall the real work of the dinner, the hostess being concerned mainly with the task of attending to the grouping together of congenial friends.

Corinne Griffith who is appearing in First National's "Declasse," has occasion to entertain lavishly and finds the following rules helpful:

After the hostess decides to give a formal dinner, invitations are sent out. Many details may be left to the butler, but it is the hostess's duty to arrange the place cards in the order they are to be put on the table. The host at one end of the table with the lady guest of honor at his right; the hostess at the other end of the table with the most important male guest at her right, the other guests are seated in between. The following courses usually comprise the menu of a formal dinner:

Oyster or Fruit, Soup, Fish, Entree, Roast, Salad, Dessert, Coffee. In setting the table, it is permissible to use various tablecloths in keeping with the period of furniture, but a white damask table-

cloth is always good form. After laying the felt, it should be carefully placed, then lay the centerpiece upon which the principal decoration will be placed—either a rare piece of silver, bowl of flowers, or some other ornament, next arrange the candles.

The salad fork, if it is the third fork used, is placed nearest the plate, but as this menu includes an entree, the salad fork will be brought in later, and any other additional knives, forks or spoons that will be required will be put on the table during the progress of dinner. Bread and butter plates are never used at a formal dinner. Salt and pepper sets can be used by two persons.

When the butler announces that "dinner is served," the host offers his arm to the lady of honor and other guests follow, with the hostess and her escort coming last.

For formal dinners, the Russian service is used, which means that everything is served from the side. The empty plates are placed for the various courses and all the food is passed—arranged on suitable dishes—and each person helps himself. Each dish in turn is taken to the kitchen or pantry and not left on the table. Sometimes, in-

stead of the guest helping himself, the food is arranged on individual plates and served to each person. It is important that a plate be at each cover all during the dinner until the table is cleared for dessert.

As the table is made ready for dessert, all salt and pepper sets, plates, crumbs and silver are removed, the crumbs being brushed off with a folded napkin onto a tray. There is more than one accepted way to serve dessert, but the following is correctly in keeping with a dinner served in the home. The finger bowl dolly and plate are placed on a fruit plate with dolly in between and a dessert fork and spoon is placed on either side. The guest lifts the finger bowl from the top plate, and should the dessert be ice cream eats it from this plate after which it is removed leaving the fruit plate.

Fruit is passed, and if taken a fruit knife and fork are supplied. Chocolates or other sweets are passed last. After the ladies have gone to the drawing room, coffee is served to them there, and to the gentlemen either at the table or in the smoking room.
