CRAWFORD HOUSE
PARTIALLY BURNT

More than \$800 damage was done to the house owned by Charles Crawford at 823 Pine street this morning when a fire from an unknown source practically destroyed the upper story. The house was occupied by J. A. Galarneau, Mrs. Galarneau had been absent from the house during the morning, attending a funeral, and upon her return found the rooms filled with smoke. The alarm was sent to the fire department at 10:15. According to Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose the fire was probably started from mice and matches. The fire could not be laid to defective wiring and the start of the fire was sufficiently far away from the chimney to scotch that belief. Insurance of \$1500 was carried on the house. The household goods were practically all saved. No insurance was carried on them.

According to Chief Ambrose, the Galarneau fire amounted to more damage than all fires during the three months of January, February and March of this year.

The deceased leaves a widow and a son, Philip, aged 11. He is also survived by a brother, Walden Trotter of Klamath Falls; a sister, Mrs. Richard Heiman of Mahol, Ore., and a sister, Mrs. C. E. Craig of Merrill.

The funeral will be held from the Merrill Presbyterian church, with the Rev. C. C. Hulet officiating. The Moose lodge will have charge of the services at the cemetery. The exact date of the funeral will not be decided until word is received from out of town relatives.

SCORES MOURN CHIEF'S DEATH

Indians Come From Miles Around to Attend Funeral of Leader

YREKA, California, March 28.—When Frank Jacobs died at his home at Ferry Point, near Happy Camp on the lower Klamath river recently, it marked the passing of one of the few of the remaining survivors of the Klamath tribe.

Just how old Jacobs was, no one seems to know, but his approximate age was not less than 80 years and in this span of life he had seen the Klamath a tribal hunting ground that changed with the coming of the white man to a feverish hotbed of gold-seekers, who wrested fortunes from the hills and the streams and passed on almost as quickly as they had come.

In spite of his age, Jacobs took a leading part every year in the annual Indian festival, the Pick-toonish which is celebrated on Clear creek. So great was the respect that his tribesmen held for him that for miles up and down the Klamath Indians came by horseback and on foot to attend his funeral and the burial that followed in a plot near the home he had known for many years. Prior to his death Jacobs lived with his sister and his son, Frazier Jacobs, who survive him. Jacobs had been a widower for
