No discredit for the fizzle of the main event of last night's card should be blamed on Joe. He tried his best to put Gordon away and only the shyness of his opponent in making prevented. The boys were simply badly matched so far as weight is concerned.

The first round opened with Gorman tearing after Gordon with both arms swinging. Able dodged, twisted and jabbed his way around until he tried to break Joe's good right fist with his chin. The fist won and Able was temporarily upset.

The second round, was the best of the three. Gordon showed a bit of his old time fighting ability and stood up and swapped punches with Gorman. At one time the fans were on their feet when the little fellow pasted Gorman three times in the chin without a return.

Throw In Towel

But the terrible third placed the indelible stamp of rottenness on the main event. Gorman sailed after Able and let loose a couple of heavy punches which struck Able's arms. Gordon, from one of these arm knock-outs, sank to the floor and then Able's able assistants waved the white flag.

Gorman outweighed Gordon over 15 pounds. The unofficial weights were, Gorman, 132 and Gordon, 118.

Harris Is Winner

The real strap of the card, was the go between Wilbur Harrington and Harris of Medford, which ended in the second round with Harrington going down for the count of ten.

Harris brought a wicked wallop with him, from Medford, and it took just about ten seconds of the first round to prove it to Harrington.

At the clang of the gong Harrington tore across the ring and began to tear into his slimmer but taller opponent.

Harris parried, clenched his right fist and:

"Sock!" Right on the point of the chin, and Harrington went down like he was struck with an ax. Harrington recovered and put up a game fight the rest of the round but went down again from sledge hammer blows delivered by his opponent.

The second round, Harrington took a new lease on life and mixed it furiously with Harris. The Medford mixer stood off calmly until he saw his opening and then chopped over a vicious right cross that

knocked Harrington cold for ten seconds and then some.

Down For Count

The heavy weight bout between Himelwright and Mayberry ended over the knock-out route but strangely, Mayberry had taken a couple of nose dives for the fans when in the second round he saw his heavier opponent rushing toward him anxious to end the affair. Mayberry, just about the time Himelwright started a haymaker, half turned his back. The blow caught Mayberry in the back of the neck and knocked him as cold as a salted herring.

A quick chop to the jaw in the first round ended the match between Chick Kennedy and Jack Crim. Kennedy was fighting close to the ropes when Crim reached over and planted one on the side of his jaw. Kennedy draped himself over the rope like a wet rag.

The bout between Adams of Salem and Popular "Dummy" Poole was another fizzle. Adams, obviously inexperienced, sought protection from Poole's blows by embracing his opponent in clinches at every opportunity. Referee Bobby Ross finally stopped the fight in the fourth round and gave the match to Poole.

Morgan and Lightfoot fought a fast curtain raiser.
