"SILENT CAL" GETS REDSKIN COGNOMEN

WASHINGTON, Apr. 1.—The same of Bear Ribs was bestowed on President Coolidge today by the Indian Kenel district of North Dakota in recognition of the citizenship rights granted to them. The name is that which was borne by a chief of the Hunkapapas who was killed when he sought to teach the Indians the white man's way, after

peace had first been brought about between the Indians and the white men.

"Now that we know that Bear Ribs was right" the letter from the Kenel Indians said, "and because he was a far seeing progressive man we now give you the name Bear Ribs, known to our tribe."

The letter was signed by Antoine Claymore, by his finger print mark, Jovith Badger and Plus Shouts-first. Accompanying it was a pipe and beaded tobacco-bag.
