## DODGE PLANT IS REPORTED SOLD

**NEW YORK, April 1.**—News that the Dodge Brothers Automobile company of Detroit has been acquired by a syndicate headed by the banking firm of Dillon, Read & Co. of New York, is prominently published here today as one of the most important financial transactions in the history of automobile history.

The sale is said to have involved more than \$100,000,000, practically in cash.

Representatives of the banking firm declined either to affirm or deny the sale and Clarence Dillon declared that, while final negotiations had not been completed, some announcement relative to the deal would be made within a day or two.

In financial circles here it was declared that the sale consummated a financial battle between Dillon, Read & Co. and the house of J. P. Morgan & Co., representing the General Motors corporation, to gain control of the Dodge Brothers' property. It was also believed that the sale was preparatory to a \$500,000,000 merger of the Dodge property, the Packard Motor company and the Hudson Motor company and the Briggs Body corporation.

Confirmation for this also was lacking.

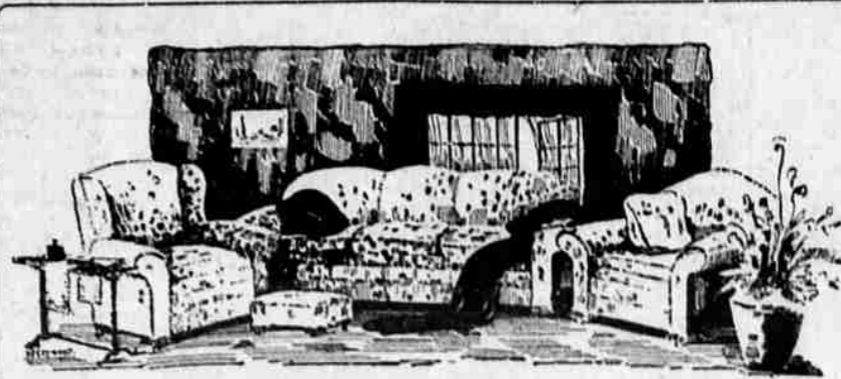
Sale of the Dodge Brothers company marks an eventful step in the romantic history of the concern, which began under the guidance of John and Horace Dodge, who had been stockholders in the Ford Motor company until they went into business.

The present firm was started in 1914, with a capitalization of \$10,000,000, which was increased to \$50,000,000 in 1923. The major part of the shares is held by the Dodge estate. Last year the concern did a gross business of \$191,000,000 and it is expected that the sales will go above \$200,000,000 this year.

### TAKES OATH OF OFFICE

**WASHINGTON, April 1.**—Thomas F. Woodlock, who was given a recess appointment to the interstate commerce commission by President Coolidge, took the oath of office today. The senate failed to act on Mr. Woodlock's nomination at both the last regular and special sessions, but under his appointment he can serve until the end of the next regular session of congress.

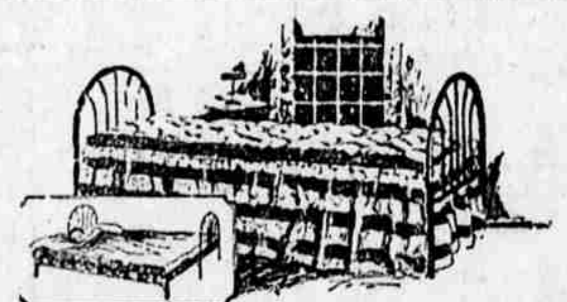

## OFFER INVENTORS PRIZES FOR IDEAS

**LONDON, April 1.**—The simple expedient of offering prizes of \$50 has resulted in the discovery that there are 152 amateur inventors in England whose inventions have a commercial value. The Institute of Patentes offered prizes for the best inventions in several classes, and about 500 inventions were submitted from which four major prize winners were selected. The 152 inventions will be submitted to various manufacturers.

The major prizes were awarded to the inventors of a kettle with a lid that will not fall off; a portable fire; a telescope based on the theory of relativity for gauging the speed of machinery, and a machine for bending rods and tubes.

Sir William Grey-Wilson, head of the institute, is an inventor of renown and his house is full of his handiwork. One of the most ingenious is in the chicken house. A few grains of corn are placed in a tin

beneath the perches. When the chickens awake and peck at the corn, a spring is released which opens the door of the house.

## PRINCE OF WALES STARTS TO DIET

**LONDON, April 1.**—The Prince of Wales, who is in his early thirties, has already begun to fret a little with the fear that he may suffer from embonpoint, say physicians close to the royal family. Just prior to the beginning of his voyage to South Africa and South America he was examined by several specialists, it is declared, and when the trip ends he will be gone over again, being anxious to discover just what effect these ambassadorial jaunts have upon his physique.

During several of his previous tours he took on weight, and as he has a dread of achieving a figure suggestive of the lines of his grandfather, Edward VII, he has made up his mind to keep tabs on him-

self with the aid of several well known specialists.

## Czecho-Slovakia Shown on Malin Theatre Film

A program of unusual interest to those residents of Malin and Merrill who come from central Europe will be given Friday evening, April 3, in the Broadway theater at Malin, when a film depicting scenes in Czecho-Slovakia will be shown.

The film is in the nature of a trip through the most interesting parts of the new republic. It was shown in Chicago March 15 to 21, playing to big crowds.

Accompanying the film will be a descriptive reading in English.
