Gustavo is working out daily at Scandinavian hall, while Burke is training at the Elks' club. Both declared today that they are in great condition and will be ready for a finish match in order to settle the question of supremacy.

The Klamath Falls grappler has a host of loyal friends who believe he can hold his own against the heavier bone crusher, but Gustavo is plainly peeved over the way

a recent match was prepared for him here and is out to pin Burke's shoulders to the mat if he can possibly do it.

The Moose lodge is also arranging for a couple of cracking good preliminary boxing matches to back up the main event. Young Wade, who came here recently from the Grays Harbor country, and who is now working at Alameda, is booked to show his dukes in one four-round match, while Jack Crim, Indian fighter, will be signed with some good boy in the other.

With two real boxing bouts of four rounds to back up the Gustavo-Burke wrangle, the lodge promoters are predicting the biggest wrestling crowd of the season.

INDIANS WILL TRY TO DEFEAT NURMI

LOS ANGELES, April 2.—A little squad of Indian long distance runners of the Sherman Indian school near Riverside, are training with an intensity and enthusiasm that perhaps they never have equalled before. They have a stiff assignment—the defeat of Paavo Nurmi, and if they do not accomplish their goal, it will not be because of lack of preparation.

The four Indian distance men who will meet the record smashing Finnish runner at the coliseum here April 25 are Willie Ray Arunas, Garnett Billy, Amos Hojowewa and Tom Humphries and they were picked by Charles Paddock and Loren Murchison, star sprinters, as possessing the requisite stamina and speed to compete against the Finn prior to their departure on a trip around the world. Paddock and Murchison spent much time in giving the Indians instructions.

YOKEL TOSSES RAY McCARROLL

PORTLAND, Ore., April 2.—Mike Yokel and Louis Pergandas were the winners in a double main event wrestling card here last night, in which the other principals were Ray McCarroll, Pendleton, and Frank Pilling, claimant to the Canadian championship.

Yokel took one fall and the decision from McCarroll, and Pergandas pinned Pilling in two out of three falls. All four grapplers are light heavyweights.

The only fall in the Yokel-McCarroll tussle came after one hour, eight minutes, and twenty three seconds of rough wrestling. Yokel clamped on hold after hold, only to have it broken by the powerful Pendleton man. Finally Mike won the fall with a toe hold. After the fall they wrestled out the remainder of the hour and a half time limit without another fall. It was a match of McCarroll's immense strength against the cunning of Yokel.

In the other main event, Pilling opened with a clever burst of speed and just eleven seconds after time was called, he had Pergandas on the mat for the first fall, made with a flying mare hold. Pergandas took the second and third falls with short arm scissors holds. The second in 38 minutes and the last in one minute, forty seconds. The match was fast throughout.

BASEBALL DOPE BOOK MAKES ANNUAL APPEARANCE

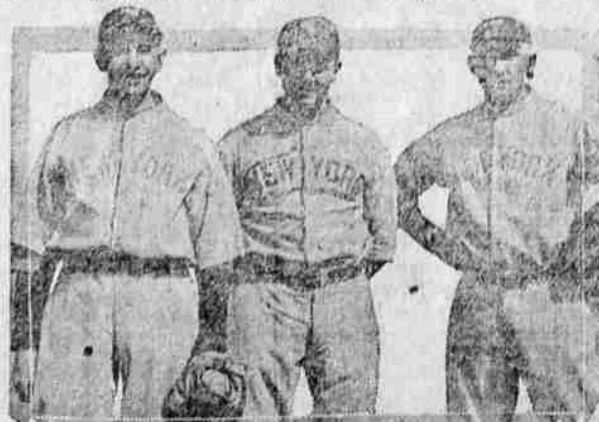

WOMEN WILL EXHIBIT IN BIG CANINE SHOW

LONDON, April 2.—Eight thousand dogs, from comical little pups weighing but a few ounces to massive, moping St. Bernards, were entered this month in Craft's show, the greatest crowd of canines ever exhibited in England. Almost one-tenth of the entries were Alsatians. The interest in them beginning after the war has increased with unex-

ampled rapidly, until the Alsatian has become the most popular of all show dogs in Great Britain.
