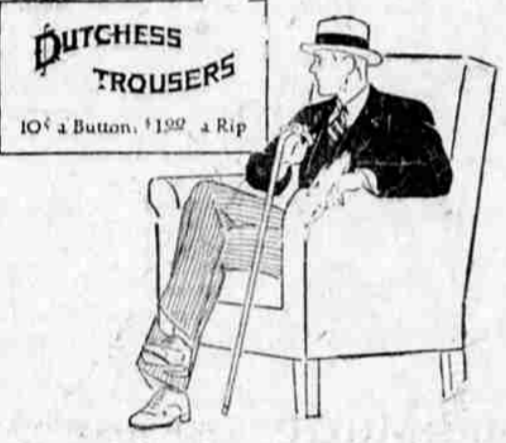

IRRIGATION BONDS GIVEN EXTENSIONS

SALEM, Ore., April 2.—An extension of six months in the period of state interest guarantee on bonds of the Tumalo irrigation district of Deschutes county was granted yesterday by the state irrigation securities commission. Interest is being paid on bonds to the sum of \$650,000. Representatives of the district asked for an extension of two years, but this the board refused, and State Treasurer Kay intimated that unless greater progress is made in colonization he will oppose further extensions. Rhea Luper, state engineer, recommended the extension. The project embraces about 15,000 acres.
