Both grapplers have their hosts of followers and supporters and for this reason the match Wednesday

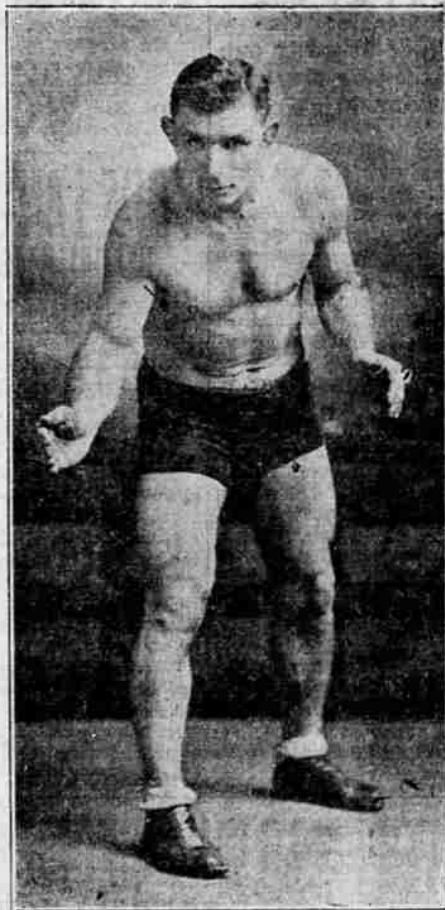
night is expected to draw the largest crowd that has attended a wrestling bout this season.
