## POLICEMAN SLAIN IN PISTOL BATTLE WITH DIVORCED MAN

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 6.—Police Officer T. B. Knox was killed and Carl M. Rogers, 27, is dying as the result of a spectacular pistol fight last night, when the policeman attempted to rescue Rogers' divorced wife and Enoch Gregg, 23, from Rogers, who was menacing them with a pistol in an automobile.

Rogers stopped the machine in a downtown street and the fight began when Policeman Knox responded to the screams of Mrs. Rogers. The woman was wounded slightly and a bullet passed through the coat of Gregg, her escort, without injuring him.
