### Rangers Go to School To Fit Selves for Work

With winter bringing a respite in some degree to the arduous duties of the field men of the U. S. Forest Service in Oregon and Washington, they have gone to school—correspondence school—to further fit themselves for their work this summer.

The district forester's office at Portland is sending out to the field men technical information of value in preventing and extinguishing fires data on forest law enforcement and all other subjects related to the daily work of these hardy fellows who follow the mountain trails and dense forests to protect this great public domain.

In addition to this instruction, all of the foresters of Oregon and Washington attended at least one of a series of meetings which were held in February and March, under the direction of William B. Osborne, Fire specialist of the forest service, at which the subject of fire prevention was discussed.

### FIRE LOSS EXCEEDS CUT

Match Company's Damage by Flames Declared Heavy

CHICAGO, Apr. 5.—The loss in forest fires to the company's timber in California last year exceeded its total year's cut in that state, W. A. Fairburn, president of the Diamond Match company, reported today to the stockholders in annual session. He said the company's 1924 fire loss was equivalent to 55 per cent of its year's total timber cut, and blamed campers and smokers largely for the losses in spite of the company's scientific work in forest preservation.

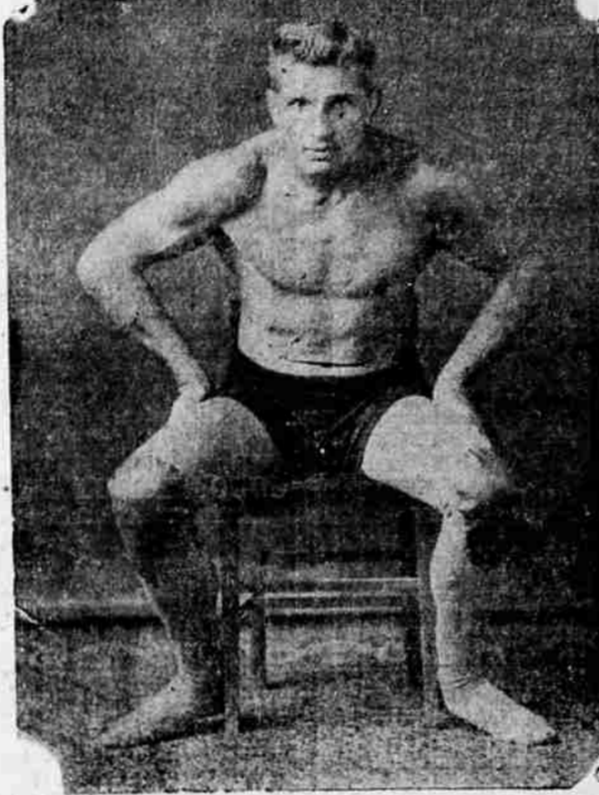

Algoma probably will be there in force to see Wade in his first Klamath appearance.
