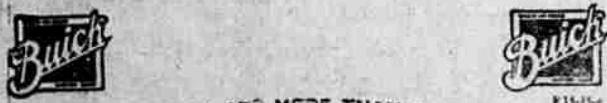

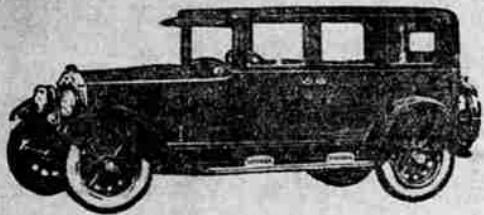

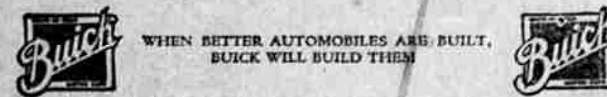

Prohibition Agent is Arrested

Clyde Cheeseman, One of Merrick's Most Active Aids, Taken with 12 Transporting Contraband—One Wounded

NEW YORK, Apr. 7.—Clyde Cheeseman, who has been one of the most active prohibition agents under Divisional Enforcement Director R. Q. Merrick, was one of the twelve men arrested in Harrison, N. J., early today by Hudson county detectives, who at the same time seized two motor trucks and 2500 cases of beer.

The prisoners all were charged with the illegal transportation and possession of intoxicants in violation of the Hobart act, the New Jersey State enforcement statute.

led by Patrick J. Hayes, former chief of the Hoboken police and now head of the complaint bureau of the Hudson county prosecutor's office, six detectives watched the Lackawanna Railroad yards in Harrison for four hours before the men were taken into custody there. The detectives closed in on them as

transferring the beer from trucks to cars escaped. Several of them drew weapons as the detectives approached on the run, and an exchange of bullets followed. None of the detectives was struck, but Frank Smiker, of 54 Barber street, Manhattan, one of the prisoners was slightly wounded in the hand.

The confiscated beer and trucks were removed to Goodman's warehouse on Bergen avenue, Jersey City, and the prisoners were taken to the office of Prosecutor John Milton, where Assistant Prosecutor McMahon interrogated them. Before the questioning was concluded it was reported that they all steadfastly refused to talk.

STRICT CURFEW LAW IS URGED

Seeking an amendment to the city curfew law by making the parents responsible for their children and by setting the curfew hour at least an hour earlier, a deputy district attorney appeared last night before the city council and related startling tales of juvenile delinquency which came to light yesterday.

The deputy told of the operations of a gang called the "Octopus," composed of a gang of boys from 10 to 14 years of age. The admission requirements of the gang were that the candidate must single handed steal some article of money, he said.

The present curfew law stipulates that boys and girls under 18 years of age must be off the city streets after 9 p. m. during the winter months and 10 p. m. during summer months. The representative of the district attorney's office urged that 9 o'clock be the latest hour that young boys and girls should be allowed to be on the street.

After long discussion of various aspects of the proposed amendment, City Attorney J. H. Carnahan and the deputy prosecutor were asked to draft a tentative ordinance for consideration by the council.

Final decision on the granting of the bus franchise will probably be made next Thursday evening. It developed, when councilmen agreed to meet in special session to take up the question. G. E. Reynolds, representative of the Mack Truck company, represented the Astoria Auto Bus Street Car company, which is seeking a franchise here. He outlined briefly the plans of the Astoria concern if granted the franchise and stated that nothing but the latest equipment would be used.

SHOTS END DRUG CHASE

Two Men Held in Jersey on Narcotic Sale Charges

KEARNEY, N. J., Apr. 7.—Harry Taub, said by police to be well known in the Metropolitan district as a seller of narcotics and to live in Manhattan, and Michael Marcell of 598 Chestnut street were arrested at Arlington Depot Square and Elm street last night by Joseph McCarthy, a Federal narcotic agent and a group of Newark and Kearney detectives after a chase in which the detectives fired six shots.

Taub's address was not obtained. According to McCarthy, he is now out on bail awaiting trial on a Federal narcotic charge on which he was arrested in Newark several months ago.

The police say Detective O'Leary of the Newark police and another man gained the confidence of the two suspects, purchased a quarter ounce of cocaine from Taub and Marcell in accordance with a pre-arranged plan and gave them \$8 in marked bills while McCarthy and the other detective concealed themselves in doorways.

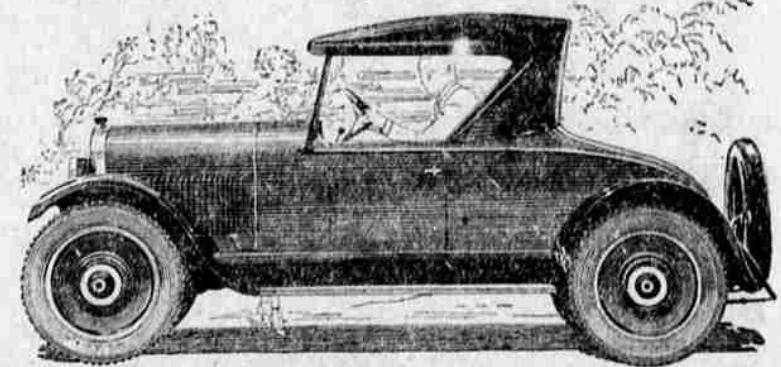
As the detectives who had been in hiding emerged, the police declare Taub and Marcell broke and ran, but halted when a volley of pistol shots were fired over their heads. The prisoners were taken to Newark to await arraignment before a Federal Commission.
