

Grapplers To Clash Tonight In Main Event

H. BURKE AND GUSTAVO AWAIT GOING FOR BIG BATTLE AT MOOSE HALL

Two titans of the ring will engage in combat tonight at the Moose hall in the persons of Henry Burke, veteran toiser of Klamath Falls, and Ad Gustavo, whose flashy performances on the wrestling mat have thrilled the fans of this city on other well remembered occasions.

Seldom, if ever, have any two men more evenly matched been signed in this city to have it out with each other, as Burke and Gustavo. The two men are fast, heady and have many years of experience behind them in the wrestling game.

Klamath fans will be introduced to something new when a wrestler will take on a fast boxer in one of the preliminaries. These freak matches have proved successful and great drawing card attractions.

Two fast boxing preliminaries will speed up the card it was announced. Joe Miller, protege of Able Gordon, will take on Joe Adams, who fought in the last boxing match held here. These two boys will tear things loose, if they

perform in the ring as they have this week during workouts. Both will tip the scales at 135 pounds when they enter the ring. Besides this scrap there will be another fast boxing mix, the promoters announce.

Taken as a whole, the mixed card promises to be one of the most interesting ever staged in Klamath Falls. Not only because of the ability of the main eventers, but because of the diversity of attractions. Boxing, one bout between a wrestler and a boxer and the final bout between two wrestlers of the experience of Burke and Gustavo, testify to action from the opening gong to the cheers at the end when either Gustavo or Burke will be declared winner.

BOXING CARD IS BEING ARRANGED

Earl Ritchie Would Feature Headline of Big Fight Show Here

Earl Ritchie, well known local heavyweight fighter, will be matched against one of three veteran heavyweights of the Pacific coast in the main event of a boxing card to be staged in Klamath Falls within the next few weeks, it was announced today by Promoter J. E. Patterson today.

The three heavyweights, one of whom will clash with the local scrapper are Rocco Strambo of Portland, Jimmy Barry of Los Angeles and Sammy Olson of Seattle. Ritchie should be able to give any of the three a wonderful fight, according to Promoter Patterson.

Perhaps the best known of the three heavyweights is Barry, who has been taking on the best heavyweights of the country for years. Barry is a clever scrapper with a heavy punch and years of ring experience behind him. To offset this, Ritchie has the youth and strength to put Barry to sleep if he would not lose his ring confidence.

Rocco Strambo and Ritchie would bring the fans to their feet in a ten round go. Strambo, is a heavy puncher with an iron chin and game to the core. Ritchie is perhaps faster than the Portland boy and would stand a good chance of rocking Strambo to sleep along about the ninth round.

Little is known here of Sammy Olson, except that he is a fast fighter with a punch like the hoof of a mule in either hand.
