INDIAN SCHOOLS TO BE ENLARGED SOON

WASHINGTON, April 10.—In accordance with policy for increasing educational facilities for Indians, the Interior department today announced that two of the government's Indian institutions, the Salem boarding school near Salem, Oregon, and the Chilocho boarding school in Oklahoma near Arlesman City, are to be enlarged to afford a complete high school education for the students. The grades in each school will be increased soon from 10 to 12.

BABE RUTH IS MUCH BETTER

NEW YORK, April 10.—Babe Ruth is out of danger, but whether he will be out of the hospital in time for the opening game of the baseball season next Tuesday is another question—one that his physicians are inclined to answer negatively.

This word came today from St. Vincent's hospital where the home run hitter is a patient. Babe is being treated for a cold, a touch of influenza, another touch of indigestion and a bump on the back of his head. The latter is the result of his fall in the Pullman washroom—a fall which physicians at first thought had caused a concussion of the brain and possibly a fracture of the skull. They were certain today, however that the bump was all that killed Babe's head.

Ruth's doctor said he had spent a restless night. At 10 a. m. he was still asleep. A bulletin issued at 10:15 o'clock by Edward Barrow, business manager of the New York Yankees said that Ruth was "slightly improved," although his temperature was still a "little high."
