#### OUT OF THE AIR

Since the new classification of radio stations in the United States, there are 569 in active operation today. This information was disclosed by the Department of Commerce. The department has arranged the broadcasters by wave lengths instead of alphabetically as in the former lists. Of the total, 93 have class B licenses and 476 Class A licenses. According to the list 99 different wave lengths are used for the broadcasters, the class B, and the class A using 48 each.

Of the wave lengths, the 275 meter mark is the most congested of the lower wave bands with 28 stations operating at that point. Twenty five stations are operating at 268 meters and the same on 273 meters. At 278 meters are found 23 broadcasters and the 261 meter is assigned to 29 stations.

WNAC, Boston, on the 280.2 wave length, occupies the lowest class B wave length and KFUD and RSD splitting the highest wave length of 545.1 meters.

At the head of the high powered stations are WEAJ, New York, and KGD, Oakland, each with 2000 watts. Eight broadcasters use 1500 watts, 12 employ 1000 watts and six have stepped up to 750 watts. Thirty baby stations operate at 5 watts.
