ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, April 11.—Locusts, the plague of South Africa, may yet be found to have a commercial value. Eighty-eight bales of the insects, dried, weighing 18 tons, were forwarded recently from Katorne to Durban for shipment to Holland. It is recalled here that an oil for use in airplane engines, which retains its liquidity at very high altitudes, can be extracted from locusts, and that a by-product of the process is a food for cattle and poultry.
