although they are able to pay. One of them is the man who is almost the brains of this movement that is on now. Now, in regard to the Old Board of Directors, there has been a great deal of blame cast upon those men. They are men whose honor is beyond reproach and are some of the best citizens of the county. Their credit is almost unlimited. When they were on the Board of Directors they worked to the best of their ability. They made some mistakes, but I am sure not intentionally. Mr. Newell, I know, has done the very best he could, and I believe he is the most capable man we ever had in this district and I think his removal would be opposed by a large majority of the tax payers of this district.

Mr. Newell—I want to say just one thing. There is a bad case where one ranch that pays large rentals, has a vested water right, and has paid no taxes for five years, and owes the district eleven or twelve thousand dollars, and it seems to me that it is the right thing to do to make them pay. That ranch has paid a cash rental of over \$4,000.00 a year for two years. That illustrates a part of the point Mr. Drew brought forward that some large ranch owners can, but do not pay. It is true that the slump caused many a man who otherwise would have paid to get behind. It seems to me that relief should be on the basis of individual relief.

Mr. Thomas—I do not know exactly what Mr. Newell said, but understand we are not protecting any land speculators. I am talking about clearing up the general attitude here. A short time ago, Mr. Vining, who, I understand, is the president of the state chamber of commerce, made an address, at Malin. In the course of that speech, he stated that men who wanted to make money on a farm should stay on that farm and work. His remarks were rather pointed, and at the close of the meeting Mr. Jacobs and myself went up to speak to him. We asked him if his speech was interfering anything, especially, and he said perhaps he was a little rough, and said "I will tell you why I said that". He said words to this effect. That he had, a few days before, talked with Mr. Newell, the local head of the Reclamation Service, and asked why, when this was a good country and good soil and good climate, there were so many delinquencies, and Mr. Newell told him that the ONLY reason was that the farmers would rather get in their automobiles and ride up and down the paved roads than to stay at home and work. I have affidavits in my desk to that effect. One is for myself and one for Mr. Jacobs. I am not prepared to state what he told us, and will go before a Notary Public and take oath to that effect.

Nothing was said to Mr. Vining about the lack of transportation or the other difficulties.
