PREPARE EASTER MUSIC IN CHURCH

One of the most beautiful of the Easter services planned among the churches of Klamath Falls is that of St. Paul's Episcopal church, beginning with the early sunrise service at 6:30 a. m. The main service at 11 a. m. has special music designed by the choir master. The majority of the service music is the work of Sir John Stainer and Charles Gounod, both old composers of church music. Some of the words of the songs go back far into the Seventeenth century and music is also registered from Sir Arthur Sullivan, court musician and at one time organist of St. Paul's Cathedral of London, one of London's most famous churches.
