OREGON WANTS GERMAN CANNON

SALEM, Ore., April 13.—First steps towards securing Oregon's share of captured German cannon and other war trophies recently allotted to the various states by congress were taken today by Governor Pierce, who appointed Brigadier General George A. White as representative of the state for this purpose.

Oregon's share is approximately 40 tons of captured materials. The freight costs will be about \$3200, which must be borne by those seeking the trophies.

A number of requests for trophies have been received from cities and schools, including Portland, the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college.

The state is given one year in which to claim its allotment, after which it loses its rights under the allocation law.
