### Eugene Woman Is Missing Following Fire in East

NEW CASTLE, Pa., April 14.—Mrs. Anna Miller, 63, of Eugene, Oregon, is missing today after a fire which destroyed the home of W. A. Weinschenk, president of the National vegetable growers' association, at which she was a visitor. She was awakened when the fire was discovered but has not been seen since.

### AT THE LIBERTY

Some of the most realistic war scenes ever filmed appear in "The Warrens of Virginia," which was made under the direction of Elmer Clifton. The film version is made from the well known Belasco play and deals with the closing days of the Civil War.

All the war scenes were made at Camp Travis, San Antonio, Texas, the largest military reservation in the United States. Only regular army officers and men were used.

To insure military accuracy in every detail, Mr. Clifton was assisted by Col. H. O. Van Horn of the 9th Infantry U. S. A., who was assigned to him through the courtesy of the War Department.

Seven thousand soldiers comprising all branches of the service, four hundred supply wagons, sixteen hundred mules and five thousand horses are used in the big scenes.

"The Warrens of Virginia" opens a two day run at the Liberty theater today.
