British Schooner Captured by Coast Guard With \$500,000 Cargo of Wet Goods

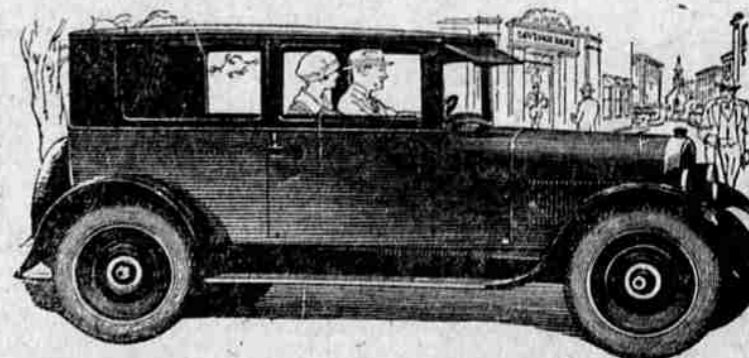
