enough, with its soil and climate, to make an empire of this valley. I am not saying that to be just pleasant, and the moment you begin to show the right disposition to help yourselves, I am sure the Bureau of Reclamation will do everything it can, whether much or little. It cannot do much itself for congress controls the amounts spent, and it is congress and the people that the Bureau of Reclamation must go to for help.

There is a feeling in the east that Reclamation is a failure. They do not want to put up any more money. We have to assure those men and show them that Reclamation can be made a paying project before they will support it. For the first time in the history of Reclamation, those who have studied the question can look forward and say that Federal Reclamation is likely to succeed, and we feel it will succeed.

A new law was passed recently advancing money for Reclamation purposes. This is the only government in the world that would do for its farmers what the United States has done for the people on these projects. They have advanced a hundred and ninety-eight million dollars. They have had payments deferred and carried along as no other government in the world would. The government is the people. You are part of it. We are only the agents of it, and the people of the United States are going to get tired spending government money and lose sympathy and the whole plan will fail, simply because we can't get the cooperation of the people on the projects.

Now I didn't expect to say these serious things, and I am a little impatient at times, but if I did not say them now I never would, but it is your problem, not the Reclamation Bureau's, nor Congress or the government as a whole, but it is the problem of you people who live here in the surrounding country. You can make a garden spot of this valley, or you can make it in the language of the Scriptures 'A habitation of dragons and corals.'

be protected is to build the ladder. Among the local sportsmen who are expected to journey to Medford and meet with the game commission are Dr. Boyd, W. W. McNealy, O. D. Matthews, Mark Howard and District Game Warden Marlon Barnes.

Another problem this is scheduled to come up before the commission is the construction of another fish ladder over the dam at Sprague river. The present fish ladder is held to be inadequate in that it does not tap the main current of the stream. To be of any use, the ladder would have to be built so that the trout backing the main current of the river would not miss the ladder.

A question of authority and agency will arise with the opening of this problem, which has been discussed and discussed for several years.

Just where would the finances for the construction of the fish ladder come from? From the state game commission? From the federal bureau of fisheries, which, owing to the government reservation, have authority? Or from the Indians themselves, through the act of the tribal council?

It is hoped by Klamath sportsmen that some plan can be devised whereby all three parties interested in the question, could join hands and bring about the construction of the fish ladder. The poor fish ladder at Sprague river dam is held to be the cause of immense loss of trout each year.

Opinion of fish authorities is that trout can not get either under or over the dam and that the only manner in which spawning fish can

## FISH LADDER TO BE ASKED

Immediate action on the construction of a fish ladder over the California Oregon Power company dam at the head of Link river will be asked of the state game commission and state game warden in Medford Thursday when that body meets with the Jackson County Game Protective association. The California Oregon Power company stands ready at any time to construct a fish ladder over the Link river dam, and at this time is awaiting the approval of the game commission and instructions of how to proceed with the construction before starting the work. A committee of the Klamath Sportsmen's association, comprised of O. D. Matthews, Mark Howard and Walter Donart, reported to Dr. W. R. Boyd, president of the sportsmen's association, that John C. Boyle, division manager of the California Oregon Power company had reiterated the willingness of the power company to build the fish ladder.
