TEACHERS VISIT IN OLD ENGLAND

Sabbatical Year Being Enjoyed by Professors From America

LONDON, April 14. — A considerable number of American college professors are spending their sabbatical year in England. The sabbatical year is the one in seven which the professors are allowed to take in order to visit foreign countries long enough to see and learn more than the flitting tourist.

The English speaking union is encouraging and helping the visiting pedagogues to see something of the social, political and educational life of this country. They are being given access to documents and material kept from the eyes of ordinary visitors.

Kessler, professor of Christian Doctrine, Iliff School of Theology, Denver, Colo., Dean Charles Mills Gayley, director of the American University Union, Mrs. Gayley and Miss Gayley, and Miss Elizabeth Jackson, assistant professor of English, University of Minnesota.

AMERICAN RESCUED

Man Captured by Mexican Bandits Is Reported Safe Following Battle

WASHINGTON, April 14.—George S. Fertner, an American citizen employed by the Penn Mexico Fuel company and abducted on April 6 by Mexican bandits near Tuxpam, has been rescued by Mexican federal soldiers.

A report to the state department from Charles Baj, American consul at Tampico, telling of Fertner's return, said that in the fight between the federal and bandit forces one bandit was killed and the leader captured and executed.

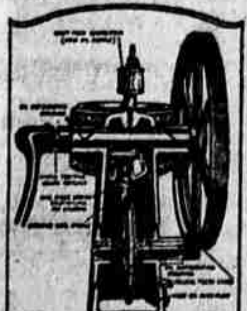
