### ADVISES CHANGE OF FIRE EQUIPMENT IN RURAL COMMUNITIES

Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose has advised the first equipment standardization crew operating out of Salem, to visit the towns of Merrill and Malin and Chiloquin before proceeding to Lakeview to standardize equipment.

If any of the towns have 2 1/2 couplings on their fire equipment, the state could force them to change from the Pacific Coast standard thread to the National standard thread, Mr. Ambrose said.

The standardizing crew, which has changed all of the city fire equipment and the equipment of the Ewauna Box company and Big Lakes Box company to the National standard thread, is now at work on the fire equipment of the Pelican Bay Lumber company. They will be working on equipment in Klamath county for two weeks to come.

According to a law passed at the last legislature all fire equipment in Oregon must be National standard. The law was passed in order that towns adjacent to each other in Oregon could render assistance in time of a large conflagration.

## SWEDES TO DRAW MANY VISITORS

GOTHENBURG, April 16.—Merchants, prelates and athletes from the United States and other countries, will this spring and summer journey to Sweden to attend trade fairs, a religious gathering and sporting contests.

The first of these will be an industrial exhibit to be held in Gothenburg May 4-10, the eighth annual exhibit of its kind, at which the best products of Swedish industries, handicraft and commerce will be shown to visitors from many countries. The second occasion for many nationalities to meet in Sweden will be the Baltic Trade Fair, which has been arranged in Stockholm for June. To this all the countries bordering on the Baltic Sea, except Germany, have been invited to send exhibits.

For churchmen the outstanding event of the year will be the Universal Conference on Christian Life and Work, to be held in Stockholm from August 19-30. From the United States alone will come about 150 delegates; Every country in Europe, as well as India and the Far East, will be represented.

Visby Cathedral, on the island of Gotland, will celebrate the 700th anniversary of its founding in July, and American athletes will compete in international games at the Stockholm stadium this summer.

## EVERY ENGLISH PIG GETS OWNER'S NAME

LONDON, April 16.—Pigs in England are to be tattooed for identification purposes. Several inks already have been tried out, but the idea has not as yet been perfected, therefore to stimulate further interest the scientific research committee of the Large Black Pig Society has offered a reward for a satisfactory system of tattooing.

The present system of ear notches or numbered ribbons for registration of pigs is very unsatisfactory, says the society, which recently has been urging ink manufacturers to turn out a product which would make possible not only the tattooing of black pigs, but Berkshire, or blonde pigs, as well as different kinds of cattle.
