Ben Dorris Is Ousted From State Game Board

SALEM, Ore., April 16.—Political differences and a breach in friendship that has been widening since early in the late legislative session caused Governor Pierce yesterday to oust Ben F. Dorris of Eugene from the state game commission. The governor appointed M. H. Bauer of Corvallis to fill the vacancy.

The schism between Dorris and the governor was started when Dorris early in the legislative session said he had showed himself in favor of taking the appointment of the fish and game commissions out of the hands of the governor and placing them in the hands of the state board of control.

NEW INDUSTRY TO START SOON

Word has been received by the local S. P. office that a representative of the firm of Agard & Turner of Berkeley, is expected in Klamath Falls in a few days to make a further reconnaissance of the possibility of utilizing the immense supply of pumice stone north of Kirk for building purposes. A member of the firm spent several days in Klamath Falls last fall and as a result of his investigations shipped a car load of pumice from Klamath Falls with which to make experiments. Further testifying to the belief that the firm has that pumice stone can be successfully used for this purpose, is the securing a commodity rate from the S. P. for the shipping of the product south to California. It is understood that a truck will be brought north with the firm representative and that further shipments for more experiments will be sent out of Klamath. Active shipping of the product will not begin till later in the spring because of the fact that the pumice is now soaked with rain and that owing to the heaviness of the pumice, advantage of the commodity rate could not be taken.
