

RODENT POISON OPERATIONS ARE NOW UNDER WAY

Land Owners Asked to Cooperate With County Agent in Pest Control

If land owners, after regular notice, refuse to take proper precaution toward the control of ground squirrels, authorities will step in and handle poison operations themselves, County Agent C. A. Henderson said this morning.

Cost of the poisoning operations will be assessed against the lands through the regular taxing medium.

This method of handling control operations is the only fair manner in which to protect everybody, Mr. Henderson said. If one farmer poisons and his neighbor does not, his land is promptly over run by the overflow from his neighbor's crop of rodents which has been allowed to flourish unmolested.

Success of poisoning operations last year was evident when reports came in from different farmers of the upper and lower Klamath basin regions. With a few exceptions, was gratifying, the county agent the cooperation of the land owners said. In those cases when the land owner would not take the precautions to save his own land, the authorities stepped in, poisoned the squirrels and assessed the cost again the property.

Poison can be obtained from the following places in Klamath county, the county agent's office in the basement of the court house, Merrill Mercantile company, Merrill; Mack's Cash store, Mt. Laki; Kalina's store, Malin; Sparretorn's store, Bonanza; Bly Mercantile store, Bly; and Prather's cash store, Keno.
