STRAMBO TELLS OF BLOW THAT HURT DEMPSEY

Portland Fighter Arrives to Take on Earl Ritchie in Ten Round Bout

"I didn't know what to do or what they wanted me to do, so I did it."

This was Rocco Strambo's explanation today of the blow that floored Jack Dempsey when the champion was training at Great Falls for his fight at Shelby with Tommy Gibbons.

"I was the second to put on the gloves with the champion that morning. The first guy just warmed up with him."

"Well, I got out in the ring and started to go fight. Then the champion hit me in the chest and when he did that I knew that he wanted me out because there was steam behind his blows."

"I couldn't box with the champion but I could fight. So when he got me cornered and started to bore in I started one from the floor and landed square on his eye. He went down."

It is a matter of record however, that when the plucky light-heavyweight from Portland put on the gloves with the champion the next day, he was soon battered to the floor.

Strambo steps into the ring next Tuesday night to fight a ten round bout with Earl Ritchie, local heavy-weight. He is in excellent physical shape, having trained with Tiny Herman, heavyweight boxer who defeated Captain Bob Roper and Pat Lester in Portland recently.

Strambo tips the scales at over 170 lbs. He claims that any weight advantage that Ritchie has over him, will be overcome by his harder punch and greater ring experience.

Frank Farmer and Strambo have fought four times. Each has won a decision and the other two bouts were a fast draw.

"That old left of Frank's is a hard one to figure out, Strambo said. It doesn't hurt but it does pave the way for one of the hardest right crosses in the business."

"I am anxious to lay one onto him," Felix said.
