**MARTINS MILL OFFERS PRIZE**

Best Seed Wheat Displayed at County Fair Will Be Rewarded

In order to encourage growers to produce a better quality of seed wheat, special prizes aggregating \$40 have been offered by Martin Brothers' flouring mill, Klamath Falls. It was announced today. To the growers exhibiting the cleanest, purest and best sack of Burbank, Marquis or Bluestem, a first prize of \$25 is offered. To the second best, which must be one either of the two other varieties, a \$10 prize is offered, and to the third best, which must be of the remaining variety, a \$5 prize is offered. This means a prize on each of the three varieties named, but whether first, second or third to depend entirely upon quality from standpoint of seed production. Those interested in competing for these prizes should notify the county agent's office during the growing season so that the field "couth" be inspected before harvesting. Awards will be made at the county fair, consideration being given condition of field before harvest and quality of sack of grain on exhibit at the fair.

"To those grain growers interested in improving the quality of the wheat in the Klamath basin, this offer should be of considerable importance," C. A. Henderson, county agent, pointed out. "Better quality means better prices, and improvement can only be made by careful selection and growing of those varieties in demand."
