The Matching Mode of Hat and Scarf

Marjorie Daw Selects a Charming Example of the Ensemble Millinery Which Is So Much the Vogue



The vogue of the hat and scarf which matches in material or detail is a particularly smart affectation in smart circles. The scarf, of course, is important in the new street ensembles, or in the chic one-piece frocks which are worn for afternoons, accompanied by a small hat.

Marjorie Daw, who is so charming a personality in "One Way Street," a First National film, wears a new and delightfully smart version of the hat and scarf combination in a particularly fetching afternoon hat and gown.

The frock itself, which introduces black as a leading color favorite, after a somewhat lengthy absence, is beautifully embroidered in gold in a Chinese motif. Tassels in gold lend an exotic note to the embroidery, and also finish an unusual tie, made entirely of beads in chain effect.

The little turban which accompanies the gown is of gold lace and metallic material, and closely fits the head. The scarf, which matches the hat so closely, is of gold lace, and is deeply bordered in ostrich trimming.

The vogue for matching the hat and scarf gives unlimited opportunities for adding chic to the simplest costumes. Where the hat is of organdie, a scarf of lovely tinted organdie, with perhaps a gay floral bouquet for adornment, creates a distinctive summer ensemble.

Equally effective, of course, is the sports outfit which is of wool. Just now, when tiny hats of felt lead the vogue for sports occasions, the scarf, which matches it in felt and in color, is brightly worn over a trim one-piece frock. These scarfs are gorgeous in coloring and add to their beauty by the applique which introduces startlingly brilliant shades in floral and bird patterns. The scarfs of this type which are most effective are three cornered and are frequently deeply fringed.

A particularly stunning hat and scarf combination recently exhibited in an exclusive shop had white predominating as a background, with field flowers gaily distributed over the surface in beautiful applique. The hat which matched was a jaunty little felt with a gorgeous grouping of field flowers—in felt—placed low over one ear.

Another window displayed a like combination in canary color, with light greens and orchids carrying out the vogue for pastel shades which the summer season so happily forecasts.

All black, when treated in the manner of Miss Daw's costume, takes on the air of an important color, particularly when the hat and scarf which accompany it lend a bright color note.

In the evening, when a hat is worn to the theatre or dinner, a scarf which matches it in pastel chiffon, or metallic material, is well chosen.

The sports frocks, of course, rely upon felt hats for their correct accompaniment, but frequently hats of silks are worn with the afternoon sports gown with a decided air of chic. These hats, worn with a tiny brim to becomingly shade the face, are made doubly effective by the matching scarf of silk, with its gay bouquet of flowers hung at one end, or embroidered in worsted at telling spots.

TILE DRAINAGE DITCHES BUILT

Nine Thousand Feet Built Between City and McCollum's Mill

As precaution against a recurrence of base failures on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway between Klamath Falls and McCollum's mill, nine thousand feet of tile and blind stone drainage ditches have been constructed on that section of road, engineers of the state highway commission announced today.

Seven thousand feet of the tile drainage has been laid and two thousand feet of blind stone drainage. The drains will insure adequate drainage of water from the road bed and will preserve the road.

Fifteen men are at work on the highway widening work on The Dalles-California highway between Klamath Falls and Barclay Springs. The highway crew, starting at this end of the road, have proceeded to a point just south of Algoma point.
