A SORRY MESS

The jury that passed upon the guilt of A. A. Anness returned a verdict of guilty in four minutes, according to newspaper reports from Portland. Two minutes afterwards he had been sentenced to the federal penitentiary for five years. Judge Bean, in passing sentence, stated that it was the most revolting crime of this character that had ever come before him. Yet, this man Anness was turned loose by the circuit court of Klamath county and he was defended in the federal court by W. P. Myers, acting district attorney of Klamath county. A fine condition of affairs, don't you think?

TONIGHT

If you are interested in the development of Klamath Falls; if you are desirous of keeping every entrance to this city wide open for any railroad that desires to enter; if you want to put yourself on record as being friendly to the Northern Pacific-Great Northern-Oregon Trunk lines coming to this city, then go to the city hall tonight and by your presence show where you stand. Consideration of Mayor Goddard's veto of the Strahorn resolution will come before the council tonight, provided an effort is made to pass it over his veto. Don't stay at home, depending upon your neighbor to do your duty in this matter. Be there yourself so as to register your protest against any attempt that may be made to bottle up this city. Let it be known that the day has passed when Klamath Falls can be delivered over to special interests by the city council. You have a mayor who is standing by you. Stand by him. Let him know that the people of Klamath Falls are backing him up in his fight to keep this city for your benefit and not for the benefit of the men who have been exploiting it for years.

WHY YOU SHOULD BE INTERESTED

The average resident of the city takes little interest in the fight that is being made to compel the California Oregon Power company to return to the farmers the power sites and water rights that were stolen by the Reclamation Service and handed over to that corporation. But it means more to the residents of the city than it does to the farmers, for if the farmers win it will mean the cutting of the cost of electricity in two, if not better.

This statement is made upon the experience of the Minidoka project. We take the following from the New Reclamation Era, the official publication of the Reclamation Service:

"Fortune has favored the Minidoka project in Southern Idaho in providing a surplus of electric power over the demands of the electric pumping division."

Then it goes on to tell of the selling of the excess power to the town of Burley and other communities, which in turn retail it to the small consumers. Of these latter it says:

"Small consumers pay a higher rate per kilowatt-hour than the larger consumers. Under existing lighting rates, THE SMALL CONSUMER IS ENTITLED TO USE 50 KILOWATT-HOURS FOR A MINIMUM PAYMENT OF \$1.84 PER MONTH, OR 3.7 CENTS PER KILOWATT-HOUR."

You now pay the California Oregon Power company 10 cents a kilowatt-hour. If the Klamath Irrigation district had not been robbed of its power possibilities, if it had not been prevented by the Reclamation Service from developing the electric energy, you today would be in the same position as the people of Burley. You would be paying between 3 and 5 cents for what you are paying to a private corporation 10 cents.

The people of Klamath Falls are vitally interested in this matter. It has a direct bearing upon the growth of the city. If the farmers win, it will mean a slashing of the cost of electric energy that will make Klamath Falls one of the greatest manufacturing centers in Oregon. This statement will be disputed and pooh-poohed by those who are under the thumb of the California Oregon Power company, but before the fight is ended it will be shown in these columns that this statement is correct and that instead of being the great benefactor and developer that the Power company claims itself to be, it will be seen that it is, next to the Reclamation Service, the greatest handicap and stumbling block this community has.

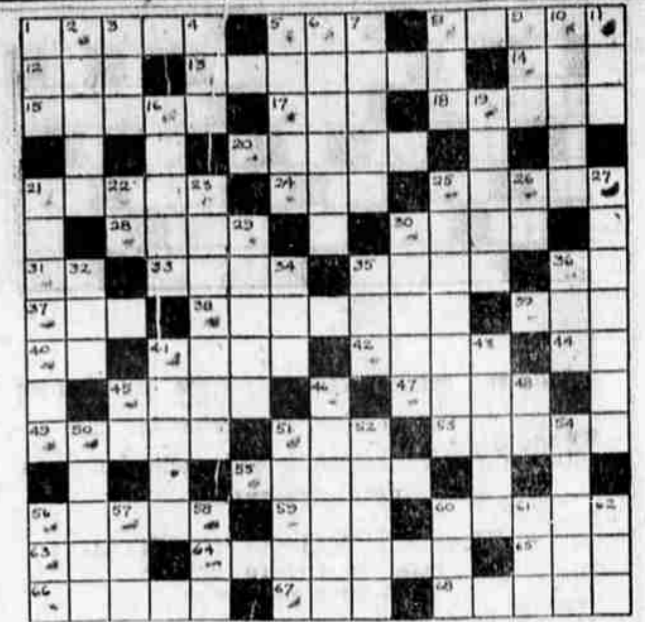
