## FISHERMEN TRY LUCK IN STORMY WEATHER; REPORT SMALL CATCHES

One hundred and ninety-two citizens of the Klamath country Saturday night peered grumpily out the front door into the snow storm and returning made the following remark to their respective wives:

"No, I guess I won't go fishing tomorrow. Raining too much. I'll stay home and tend to the garden."

Sunday morning, 192 citizens awoke, and peering outside perceived a clear, beautiful day. Each citizen scratched his head and said:

"Well, guess I'll go any way. Don't suppose there is much of a chance and I might just as well make a try. Guess the garden will have to wait till another week-end."

And in the continuous procession to and from, the automobiles streamed in from Klamath river and Williamson river, the only two streams that could be easily reached by car.

Taking everything and everybody into consideration, the fishing was poor. A half dozen baskets full of rainbows were caught on the Klamath river by dint of conscientious fishing all day long. Too many people were trying to fish the same hole of water is making it interesting, it was reported.

Anglers on the stretch of water from the Keno dam, a half mile up the river and one mile down, were the most successful. Several score of fishermen, on the theory that nobody would be fishing that stretch of water, tried it on the Klamath river below McCallum's mill. Hardly anybody could lay claim to more than two rainbows.

The number of fishermen on the Klamath river was hard to estimate. During the middle of the day, every good hole was fished by six or seven anglers.

The river was exceptionally murky, owing to spring freshets pouring into the lake. Rain, sun and spring winds alternated throughout the day.

Access to the many small trout streams in eastern, western and northern Klamath, but off the main highways, was impossible due to the condition of the roads.
