

ARMY OF PROHIBITION CLEAN UP DIVES AT WEED, CALIF.

Fifteen Men Under Arrest on Various Liquor Charges

(WEED, Calif., April 21.—Fifteen men are under arrest at Weed, following the most spectacular raid ever staged in Siskiyou county. Fourteen federal prohibition agents and 23 special deputies under the direction of H. W. Glass, general prohibition agent, swooped down on Shastina Saturday night in 10 automobiles and closed as tight as a drum what a principal raider said to be the wettest town on the Pacific coast, including Tia Juana.

The men arrested and the places raided were: Frank Spellman and Al J. Royer, Tincan cafe; A. L. Castro, J. K. Foster, H. L. Harrington, David Gibson and Paul Goodwin, Shastina club; Andy Coate, Clink Jones and J. K. Lightfoot, Elmonte hotel; Tripp Scott, Corner poolroom; Mickey Parvin, Working Man's club; John Pulas, Optimo Cigar store, and Spiro J. Jonganus and Dimadis Kokinis, Mt. Shasta poolroom.

Hundreds of gallons of whiskey, gin and moonshine were seized and bail was fixed in each case at \$1000 with the exception of Gibson, who is charged with attacking a federal agent with a deadly weapon. Gibson is said to have thrust a revolver in the face of one of the raiders and his bail is fixed at \$5000. Those who cannot give bail will be taken before United States Commissioner Gans at Red Bluff today.

The raids follow the presence in Shastina for more than a week of several federal undercover men who secured sufficient evidence to file complaint against five men not arrested Saturday night on charges of sale of intoxicating liquors and these informations will be secured this week.
