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AUTO CAMPS MUST OBSERVE NEW LAW, ASSERTS NEWSOM

Only one auto camp ground in Klamath county has thus far obeyed the new state law relating to sanitary conditions, according to announcement today by Dr. G. S. Newsom, county health officer. The law, which carried an emergency clause and was passed at the last legislative session, requires that all auto tourist camps, whether free or otherwise, must apply for and procure a health certificate from the state board of health, through the county health officer. Among the requirements are a safe water supply, a proper disposal of sewage, garbage and other waste, and enforcement of measures providing for the prevention and control of communicable diseases. The Altamont auto park has undergone the required health inspection and has been given its certificate. Other auto parks, whether privately or publicly owned, must apply for certificates at once, said Dr. Newsom, in order to protect themselves against possible prosecution.
