LUMBERMAN KILLED

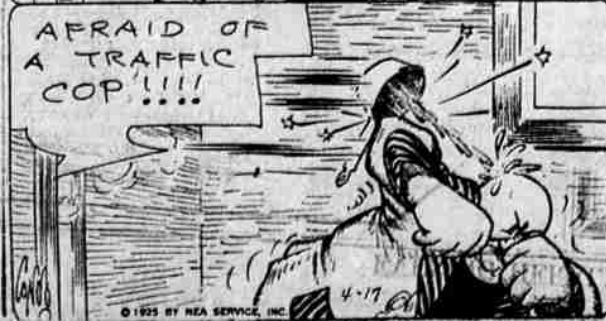

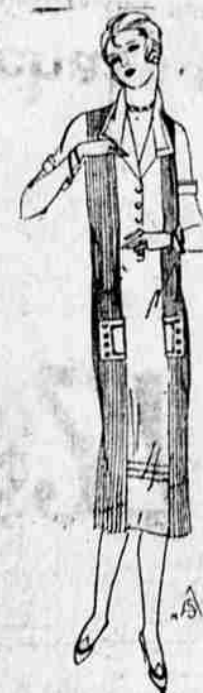
