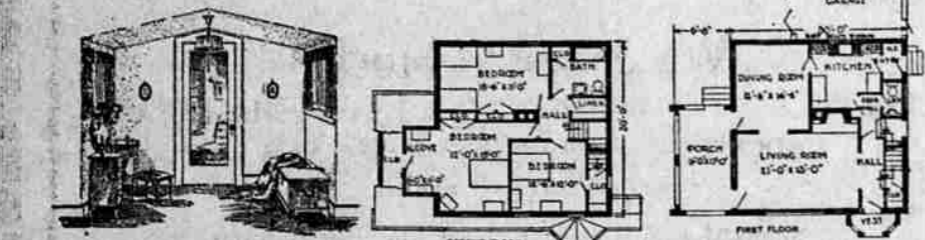

An Unusual and Distinctive House with Colonial Traditions



Six-Room House No. 635
Designed for American Face Brick Association

THE attractiveness of a house is not dependent on its size nor on a lot of expensive accessories, as is illustrated in the design shown above. The house is simple but it unmistakably has charm.

The intermediate roof or "hood," to which so many of the delightful houses in the vicinity of Philadelphia owe their appeal, is easily the distinctive feature of the front elevation. It gives an appearance of great breadth to an otherwise perfectly square house, and at the same time imparts an atmosphere of hominess.

With the great number of roofing materials, and the almost endless variety of face brick colors and textures, opportunity is afforded for many harmonious color schemes. The window sills and the various belt courses add immensely to the interest of the wall surfaces.

This house would go on a fifty-foot lot. If the house is kept close to the lot line on one side, a driveway may be had on the other. The garage, which does not show in the picture, is slightly depressed below the grade of the lot so that its roof is below the kitchen windows. A terrace is planned for the front of the house, but if the lot slopes down to the rear it may be omitted and the front lawn made level, as the basement windows placed on the other three

sides of the house will still be above grade. The attractive vestibule leads into a hall from which the open stairway ascends. A closet, close by, accommodates wraps. The hall, living room, and dining room are connected with large openings that give a feeling of spaciousness. Both living and dining rooms open onto the side porch.

Directly alongside of the dining room is the kitchen, which is modern in every respect, with its sink under a double window and cabinets on either side.

The rear entry accommodates the ice box. Entering the rear hall from the kitchen one passes the lavatory, a room closet, and basement stairs with a grade entrance, and reaches again the main entrance hall.

On the second floor are three large bedrooms, one with a spacious alcove. Note the number of closets, all of good size, also the linen closet with outside light, and the one in the large bathroom. A stairway leads to a fine storage attic.

The basement contains laundry and drying space, heater and coal bins, a garbage incinerator and a vegetable store room.

The ceiling heights are 8 feet 6 inches. The content of house is 30,750; of garage 2,000 cubic feet.
