WORK AT YONNA WELL RESUMED

Good Oil Showing Reported at 1800 Feet by Driller Hartley

After being shut down for the winter, drilling operations at Yonna Valley oil well were resumed late this week, and on the first day the drill proceeded seven feet through a sand formation which showed signs of oil, according to reports received today.

Visitors at the well, at the end of the first day of drilling, reported that after inspecting the sand scooped up from the bottom of the casing that there was little doubt but what there was a substantial oil showing.

The drill is now hammering its way down at a depth of approximately 1800 feet. Frank Hartley, driller, showed every sign of optimism in the eventual outcome of the drilling operations. He said that if oil was struck in paying quantities it would be at about a depth of 2500 feet.

Drilling will continue steadily throughout the spring and summer. It was understood that the Yonna valley well is located approximately five miles south of the West Coast well, near Dairy. It is being financed principally by farmers of the vicinity, who firmly believe in the successful outcome of the venture.
