They decided to start out for themselves, and with all their worldly possessions, with the exception of their wedding presents, started to Klamath Falls through the mountains. Mrs. Emmitt, a frail little girl weighing only 108 pounds, sitting on a horse, leading the pack horse. Emmitt walked ahead, with their 100 head of cattle.

Settling on a ranch on the Klamath river they lived there for five years, with three children blessing them. Tragedy, the first black cloud to enter their lives came one day, when an attack of scarlet fever took two of their girls, Kitty and Mabel. The second daughter born on the little ranch is now Mrs. Georgia Meyers of San Francisco, who will be in the city for the golden wedding. In 1880 they moved to a ranch near Keno where they resided until 1906. Two more girls were born to Mr. and Mrs. Emmitt. They are Mrs. Ivy Probst and Mrs. Charmon Johnson, both of Klamath Falls.

Five grandchildren and nine great grandchildren, Mr. and Mrs. Emmitt boast. Two of the great grandchildren will be present for the celebration from their home in Santa Cruz.

Reception hours are from two to three; three to four; four to five; seven until eight o'clock. A family dinner will be served later. Two of Mr. Emmitt's sisters will be present from their home in Portland. On the evening of Thursday, May 7, the Odd Fellows will entertain in the hall with an old fashioned wedding.
